

CENTRAL POINT MAN SUICIDES

**John S. Sims Takes His Own Life—
Body Found Three Hours Later—
Had Lived in Valley For Some
Time and Was Well Known.**

John S. Sims, of Central Point, committed suicide Friday afternoon about 2 o'clock by shooting himself in his right temple with a thirty-two revolver. He was not found until late in the evening, between five and six and had been dead then for three hours.

His sister, Mrs. F. M. Cornett, with whom he was boarding, left to visit some friends about 2 o'clock. Sims had told her he was going to Medford on the 2 o'clock motor, when she returned and saw some of the things he said he was going to take with him she became frightened for he had spoken of committing suicide before, as his health was poor.

She gave the alarm and neighbors responded. The toilet was entered and the body found in a pool of blood. Coroner Kellogg was immediately notified.

Mr. Sims leaves a daughter Mrs. Ephraim Chapman, who resides in Arizona.

JOSEPH GURLEY PASSES AWAY

**Stricken Suddenly Man Fails to Rally—
Acute Attack of Brights Disease
Comes in Instant—Daughters Arrived
Just Before He Was Taken Ill**

Joseph Marion Gurley died this morning at the Southern Oregon Hospital at 10:15 from an attack of acute Bright's disease. He was sick only a few hours having been stricken last evening at 7 o'clock.

He was born in Gaddistown, Georgia February 5th, 1852, and lived in Georgia until his removal to Texas twenty years ago. He was married August 20th, 1880 in Dahlonega, Ga., to Margaret Besser, whom with their seven children survive him, all living here but one son who lives in Paris, Texas.

He was in active business life all his residence here, having been mayor of Dahlonega, Ga., and postmaster at Greenville, Texas, at other times following mercantile pursuits. He was a member of the Episcopal church, Odd Fellows lodge, Woodmen of the World and has been a Mason since his twenty first year.

Two daughters, Flossie and Niata arrived from Texas last evening at six o'clock to make their home here. Funeral will be Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the family residence, 217 Apple street, burial in Odd Fellows Cemetery.

MANY BOUNTIES PAID HUNTERS

**Record in March Surpasses all Previous Months—Sixty-Three Coyotes
and 111 Bob Cats are Killed—One
Gray Wolf Falls.**

The county clerk's office broke all records in March for fees, taking in \$457.20.

The bounty paid out for wild animals was the heaviest in years. During March 63 coyotes were killed, 111 bobcats, one gray wolf and two panthers. The number of warrants issued was 48, totaling \$244.50.

The warrants for March totaled \$5646.44 and W. R. Coleman states that April will exceed \$10,000.

February's warrants totaled \$14,745.40.

January's warrants totaled \$15,196.86.
