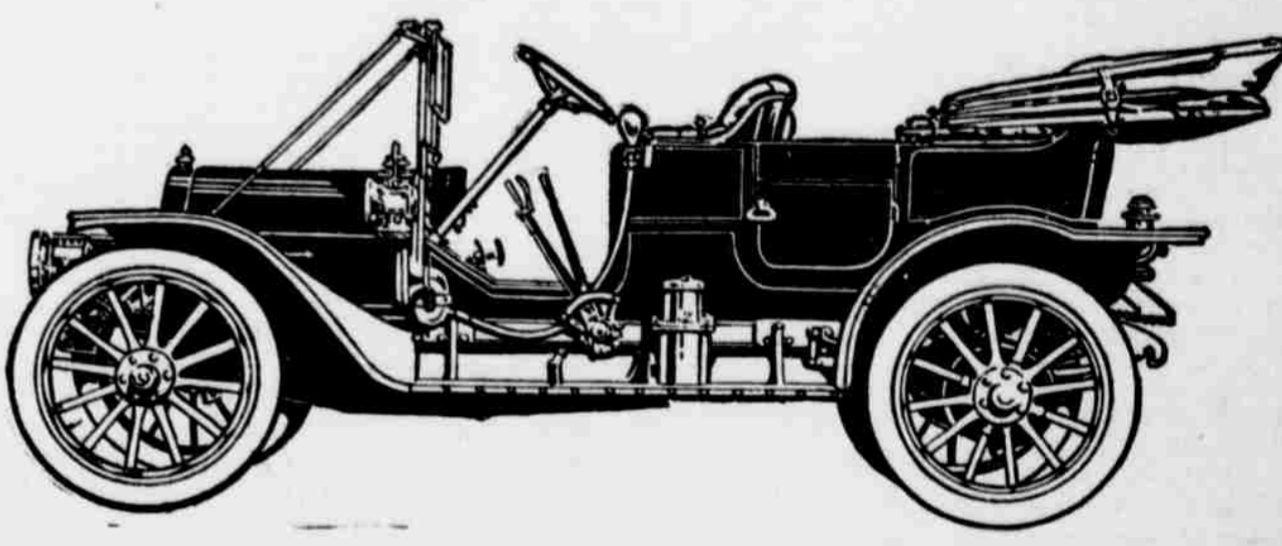

CALIFORNIA NOW HAS COMPENSATION LAW. SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 8.—Governor Johnson today signed the employer's liability act, providing for compensation of injured employees and for the creation of an industrial accident board. Under the new law, it is not a lawful defense that "the employee either expressly or impliedly assumed the risk of the hazard" or "that the injury or death was caused in whole or in part by want of ordinary or reasonable care of a fellow servant."
