BIG STRIDES BY COMPANY

Medford Cement Construction Company Has Made Big Increase Since Its Institution a Year Ago—Much Work is Done.

The plant of the Medford Cement Construction company has been increased and improved from time to time until now it has grown to be an important factor in the building business, the street improvements and the sidewalk construction of not only Medford, but nearby towns.

Commencing with the Medford Cement company, of which this company is a part, it has grown month by month to its present size.

Strong and Glidden were the original promoters.

The company employs 42 men, 27 men at the factory and 15 teamsters. The industry is divided into two parts, the screening plant and the cement pipe factory.

The screening plant is located to the south of the factory and nearer Bear creek.

The sand and gravel, by means of an endless cable and a drag scraper, which takes a cubic yard each load, is dug out of the creek bed and brought to the plant.

From the plant to the creek bed there is a haul of 300 feet.

The cable that pulls the loaded scraper is seven-eighths of an inch in diameter. The running cable is five-eighths of an inch in thickness. In all 2100 feet of cable is used.

The gravel bed is 12 feet deep and covers four acres. There are 100,000 yards of gravel in sight and every year the creek replenishes the store of gravel.

The bed of gravel cost \$2000, but it is valued at \$6000 at the present time.

The scraper brings the rock, gravel and sand up to a self-feeding hopper, where an endless chain of buckets takes it up to a revolving screen, where it is washed and sorted into sizes. There are three grades of gravel, one of sand.

After leaving the revolving screen the rocks which were too big to go through are carried to another endless chain, which takes it up to a rock crusher.

Leaving the crusher this rock is sorted into two sizes.

The line of sand, gravel and crushed rock hold 250 yards of material. When loading either sand, gravel or rock, the teams are driven under the bins and a hand lever will automatically lead the wagon. Each wagon carries two yards. The cost of material being \$2.50 a load delivered anywhere in Medford.

Clarke & Henry have ordered 15,000 yards for their building rock and curbs. Also and Fox are heavy buyers, and also the Medford hotel.

The cement factory is the most interesting of all. The cement is contained in a bin some five feet above the floor. Underneath is the machinery for making cement pipes. There are two sets for each size, four-inch and ten-inch pipes being made. The machines are called the Thomas patent belt and sewer pipe machines.

The cement flows down a chute to the forms and there a tamper striking 300 blows per minute packs the cement. The cement pipe is made in what is called a revolving jacket with a solid core, which gives the pipe a glaze and a cement finish.

There are two sets on a track and while the pipe is being taken from one the other is being used. The factory turns out 450 feet of six-inch pipe each day and 500 feet of four-inch. Each pipe is two feet in length. They are stored in the warehouse 18,000 feet of pipe and a complete set of fittings.

The machinery for the cement factory is run by a five-horse power motor. The drag scraper by a 75-horse power motor. The revolving screen by a ten-horse power motor, and the rock crusher by a 20-horse power motor.

The wires to the plant carry 2300 volts. The plant cost \$20,000, but is valued today at \$45,000.

ORDINANCE NO. 183.

An ordinance authorizing the issuance of \$200,000.00 of the water main bonds of the city of Medford, Jackson County, Oregon, and directing the advertising of the same for sale in accordance with sections 116-127 of the charter of said city.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. Whereas, the city of Medford has heretofore duly caused water mains to be laid in certain streets of said city, and has duly assessed the cost thereof to the property benefited thereby in accordance with the charter of said city, and, whereas, certain owners of certain pieces of property each assessed for such improvement in a sum exceeding \$15 have duly made and filed application to pay said several assessments in installments in accordance with section 129 of said charter; and, whereas, a water main lien docket has been duly made up in accordance with the provisions of said sections of said charter, and the total amount of unpaid assessments for such water mains, and for which application to pay under the provisions of said sections above cited has been made and filed, as aforesaid, is the sum of \$20,000.00.

Now therefore, said city of Medford doth ordain as aforesaid, that there be hereby authorized to be issued bonds of said city in the total amount of \$20,000.00 in denominations of \$250 and \$500, as may be convenient.

Section 2. Said bonds shall be in the following form:

Know all men by these presents, That the city of Medford, of the county of Jackson, state of Oregon, for and in behalf of the said city, do hereby certify, hereby agree, and promises to pay to the bearer the sum of \$..... in full of the United States of America, on the presentation and surrender of this obligation on the first day of.....

in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and..... with and unto the said city of Medford, which interest thereon from the date hereof until redeemed or until the time of the semi-annual interest payment next ensuing, the redemption of which by the city of Medford shall be made by the city of Medford.

This bond is one of a series authorized by sections 116-117, 118, 119, 120, 121, 122, 123, 124, 125, 126, and 127 of the charter of the city of Medford, and is an obligation of the city of Medford aforesaid, the city hereby covenants that it will, as authorized by section 125 of said charter, cause to be transferred from the general fund of said city to the sinking fund provided by said section for the payment of the series of bonds, of which this is one, such amounts from time to time as may be necessary to enable said fund to meet all payments payable out of the same.

This obligation is not deemed or taken to be within or any part of the limitations by law as to the indebtedness of said city, and it is further certified that all the requirements of law have been fully complied with by the proper officers in the issuing of this bond and that the total amount of this issue does not exceed the limit prescribed by this act.

This bond is redeemable at the office of said treasurer at the option of the city of Medford upon payment of the face value thereof, with accrued interest to the date of payment at any semi-annual coupon period or after one year from the date hereof, as provided by said charter.

For fulfillment of the conditions of this obligation the faith and credit of the city of Medford are hereby pledged.

In witness whereof, this bond has been signed by the mayor and attested by the recorder of said city of Medford and the corporate seal of the city of Medford hereto attached this first day of.....

April 18, 1911.

He shall publish said advertisement three times in the daily newspaper published and printed in said city, and shall submit the sealed proposals received in accordance with said advertisement to the council at the next meeting thereafter.
