LOWER RATE FOR FRUIT SHIPPERS

Sacramento Has Rate of \$1.40 Lowered to \$1.15 From California to Points East of Chicago—Conference Lasts a Week.

CHICAGO, April 10.—A general reduction from \$1.40 to \$1.15 for 100 pound shipments of fruit from California points east of Chicago was announced today after a conference lasting a week between representatives of transcontinental lines and Harry W. Adams, representing the California Fruit Distributors.

The new rate will apply only to car lots and 20,000 pounds was set as the minimum shipment. The reduction will make the rate on deciduous fruits the same as heretofore has applied to citrus fruits. It will be put into effect as soon as the tariff can be published and will be in time to apply to this season's shipments.

Adams estimated the actual decrease in shipping cost to fruit growers would be \$80,000 annually.

CHICAGO, April 10.—"Pop" Coulon, manager for his son Johnny, announced today that he had closed with the Kansas City Athletic club for a 12-round bout between Eddie O'Keefe and the champion on April 26.
