

PLANTERS ARE SLAVE OWNERS

Commissioner General Keefe States in Report That Majority of Inhabitants in Hawaiian Islands Are in Practical Slavery.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 11.—Sensational statements that the majority of the inhabitants of the Hawaiian islands are practically slaves to the sugar planters and that the Japanese settlements there would form an effective force against the United States in case of war is the gist of a remarkable report made today to President Taft by Commissioner General of Immigration Keefe.

Keefe, in a direct report to the president declares that the Hawaiian sugar planters virtually own more than half of the inhabitants of Hawaii, and asserts that the claim that whites cannot do the work of the islands is a lie. As a result of his report, it is believed that the passage of drastic immigration laws affecting the entry of all orientals into Hawaii is probable. Keefe reports in part: "Almost half of the inhabitants of the islands are Japanese and their numbers are increasing rapidly. In another decade the Hawaiian islands will be nothing more than a Japanese settlement."

"Virtually all the Japanese now there have seen military service at home, and they would constitute an excellent Japanese-Hawaiian division in event of hostilities. Fifty or sixty Japanese women arrive in Honolulu on each steamer from the orient. They and their offspring are segregated and grow to maturity with all the instincts and traits of their fatherland. No attempt is made to Americanize them. "The majority of the inhabitants of the islands are vassals working long hours for the starvation wages paid by the sugar planters. These planters do not wish European or American labor. They are doing all they can to orientalize the islands and are forcing out all other immigrants. As a result of this policy the Pacific slope states are receiving hundreds of undesirable aliens who sooner or later will become objects of public charity."

IDAHO MEN IN TOILS CHARGED WITH FRAUD

BOISE, Ida., April 11.—More startling charges and disclosures are promised by government officials today following the indictment by the federal grand jury at Spokane of D. W. Staudrod, president of the First National bank of Pocatello; A. B. Moss of Payette; I. B. Parrine of Twin Falls and Paul S. Bickel of Jerome, for fraudulent use of the mails. They are all prominent in southern Idaho.

The indictments charge that the men made untrue representations in highly colored literature to promote the sale of stock of the American Hardwood company, a corporation organized to promote the sale of Eucalyptus tree lands in Kern county, California.

The indictments followed complaints made by investors.

TAFT SUSTAINED IN HIS TARIFF CONTENTION

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 11.—The United States court of customs appeals this afternoon sustained President Taft's contention that if the Canadian reciprocity agreement were in force no other country could therefore take advantage of the "most favored nation" clause and demand similar rates of duty to those given Canada on exports to the United States.

The decision was rendered in a case growing out of the reciprocity agreements made with France, Germany and other nations under the tariff law in 1897.

Will Reproduce Old Fort.

ASTORIA, Or., April 11.—Ground will be broken in the city park Wednesday, the 100th anniversary of the naming of Astoria, for the construction of a reproduction of old Fort Astor which guarded the team in 1811.

The date was selected by the committee which has a Astoria centennial celebration in charge.

Dies of Hydrophobia.

NEW YORK, April 11.—Abraham Nahon, former secretary of the New York baseball club of the American league died here today of hydrophobia. Late last fall Nahon permitted a bulldog to lick his hands while they were chapped and became infected. The disease did not develop until months later.

Emil Reis Undergoes Agonies All Night Long When Mass of Ore at Opp Mine Buries Him in Its Rush.

Emil Reis, a mining man employed as night foreman in the Opp mine at Jacksonville and well-known here had a narrow escape from death recently. Reis was working in the stamping mill alone at the time. The ore became clogged in the chutes and he jumped down into the bins with an iron bar to loosen the masses of ore. One of his first blows dislodged a mass of rock and it came down in a slide, which buried him up to the armpits. Reis was powerless to extricate himself and his cries for help brought no response. The accident occurred about midnight and he remained buried until morning when he was found and quickly dug out. Aside from bruises and exhaustion, he was not injured.

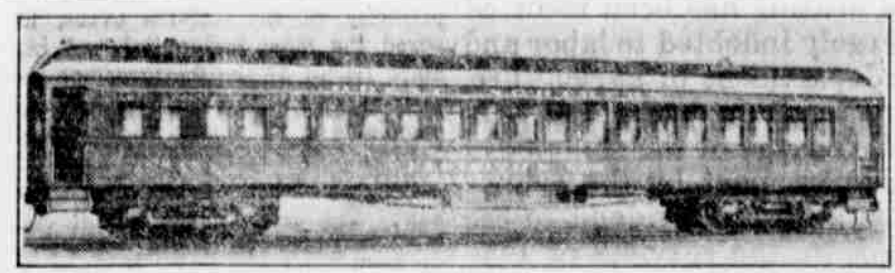
