NEW AUTOMOBILE ROAD IS PLANNED

KLAMATH FALLS, April 11.—That an automobile boulevard will be constructed from Klamath Falls to the famous Bear Flat caves in the lava beds this summer, is now announced by some of the automobile enthusiasts of the city. E. L. Hopkins, a prominent farmer of the county, who knows the country quite well, states that he will take a contract to complete this road for less than \$100. He says the country to be traversed is practically level and but a few places have rock that would have to be cleaned out. These are loose stones and could be handled easily.

The Bear Flat caves are about 40 miles from here. They are a portion of the historic wonders of the lava regions of Modoc county, California, and were there a road there it would be a great drawing card for tourists. There are three of these big caves, which are filled with ice the year round. The ice hangs from the roof and sides of the caves in great icicles.

Kidnaping Risks Taken by Loyds.
NEW YORK, April 11.—New York police look with decided disapproval on the news from London that a rich American family has insured their child against kidnaping in Loyds. Their belief is that such stories only emphasize the possibilities in the way of ransom in the kidnaping business.

"The parents of this child have increased the chances of its being stolen," one of the New York authorities says. "Would-be child-stealers know now that these parents are haunted with the fear that their baby will be stolen and that they would pay any sum within their means for the return of the child in case it should be stolen. The whole thing is most unfortunate and speaks more for the love of these parents for their child than for their wisdom."

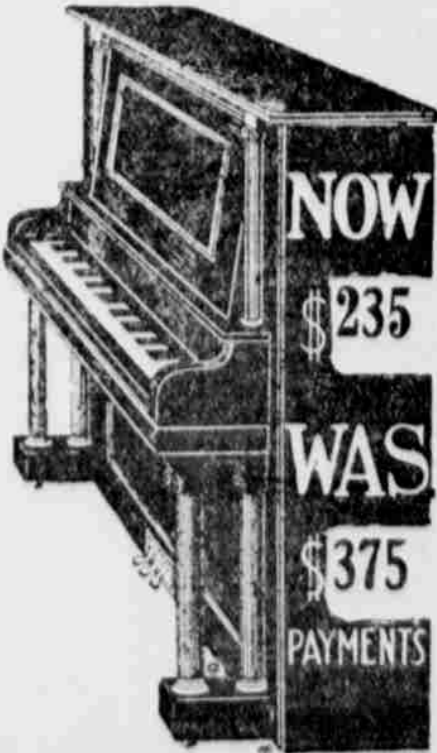
