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NO DAMAGE BY OLD JACK FROST

Severe Weather Conditions as Predicted Did No Damage—Orchards Smudged and Saved Fruit—Another Cold Snap Tonight.

The severe weather conditions predicted for Tuesday night did no damage to the crops although the orchardists had prepared for a severe fight with the frost.

At 12:30 midnight the mercury dropped from 34 to 32 and then to 30. Towards morning a slight rise took place but at 6 o'clock the temperature went down to 29 1/2 and was the lowest recorded here.

Information from outside sources state that the temperature in other parts of the valley was between 28 and 29 degrees, and at Central Point fell to 26.

Professor O'Gara states that but little firing was necessary and that the Bear creek, Gore, Hill and other orchards were entirely out of danger as the mercury did not drop below 30 degrees.

The Burrell orchards used the smudge for a short time this morning and at Central Point firing was universal.

The weather conditions tonight will be similar to those of Tuesday night and as a clearer sky is predicted care will have to be exercised.
