## BURGLARS ENTER WEEKS & M'GOWN'S

### Force Entrance Through Rear Doors and Attempt to Open Safe—Little Damage Is Done by Marauders—Keys Are Missing.

A suspect, who refuses to give his name, with lacerated hands, is lodged in the city jail today following the attempted burglarizing of Humphrey's gun store Monday night and the entering of Weeks & McGowan's furniture establishment. The attempt on Humphrey's was frustrated by three young men who happened to be in the rear of the store at the time and who took a shot at the midnight marauders, without hitting them, however.

About 9:15 Tuesday night, Irwin White, who is employed by Mr. Humphrey, and two friends, Paul Schuler and Frederick Heath, were sitting in a small room in the rear of the store when they heard someone talking in the alley. White has been in the habit of sleeping in a small bedroom behind the salesroom, and he and his companions had just come from a game of billiards when they heard the disturbance.

The lights were quickly turned out and all kept quiet and awaited developments.

From the conversation of the robbers, there were judged to be three in the party, and soon the rear door was subject to their attention.

One of the party tried to insert a skeleton key, but the regular door key was in the keyhole and he was unable to do so. After shaking the door and evidently confident that they were unobserved, one of their number was boosted to the window sill and preparations made to break the glass.

The shadowy form of the intruder could be seen feeling over the window glass and White, who by this time had secured a revolver, made up his mind that matters had gone far enough, and took a pot shot at him, the bullet striking the window ledge but a few inches from where the burglar was standing. As the bullet was fired from a sharp angle, an inch further to the right would in all probability have brought the man down.

Dropping from the sill, the man and his companions made a wild dash through the alley and escaped, falling over ladders and boxes in their flight, and making a great racket.

Night Officer Cinade was immediately notified and after some search noticed a suspicious looking character skulking about town and after stalking him for some time managed to land him in a cell at the city hall.

More complications were added to the case this morning when Mr. Mordorf of the Wolff & Mordorf Furniture company discovered that the rear doors of the Weeks & McGowan furniture store had been broken in. Going to the back of his store about 7 o'clock this morning, he noticed the glass in the doors of Weeks & McGowan to be broken, and upon investigation found three suitcases, one in the alley and two hidden in a dry goods box.

Wilbur Milligan, who is in the employ of Weeks & McGowan, notified the proprietors over the telephone. Upon investigation the dial of the safe was found to be splattered with blood and blood stains were found on the broken glass doors. One of the burglars evidently had secured a severe gash in breaking the glass. Outside of the three suitcases nothing was touched.

Mr. Weeks was in the store at 10 o'clock and noticed nothing unusual, and Mr. McGowan peered into the store shortly after midnight, but could see no signs of disturbance. They seem to think that the store was broken into early this morning, but Mr. Humphrey is inclined to think that the deed occurred before 9 o'clock and that the thieves intended to fill the suitcases with guns and ammunition from his store.

A close examination of the man arrested last night discloses the fact that both his hands are badly lacerated through contact with some jagged edge, such as a broken door or window glass.

Upon being questioned, he told two different tales as to how his injuries were received. Upon his arrest last night he stated that he had had a fight with a Southern Pacific conductor on a train at Hornbrook, Cal., but when questioned by Chief Hixon this morning said that he had been thrown off a train several miles this side of Hornbrook. He could offer no explanation of why he was in Medford at the time of his arrest.

## BITULITHIC FOR NORTH YAKIMA

### Extensive Street Improvements provided for in Two of the City's Best Districts—Warren Construction Company Given Contract.

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., April 13.—By unanimous vote the council last night awarded the contract to the Warren Construction company of Portland, Or., for the laying of bitulithic pavement and the construction of concrete sidewalks, curbs and gutters in the West Yakima improvement district and the Pleasant avenue improvement district. The Warren Construction was the lowest bidder on both jobs and the total cost will be close to \$15,000.

The adoption of bitulithic pavement in North Yakima was the result of careful investigation by the council in various cities of the northwest where bitulithic has been laid from one to eight years.

Last year North Yakima laid some brick and asphalt pavements, neither of which came up to expectations.

Active work on the new improvements will begin at once.

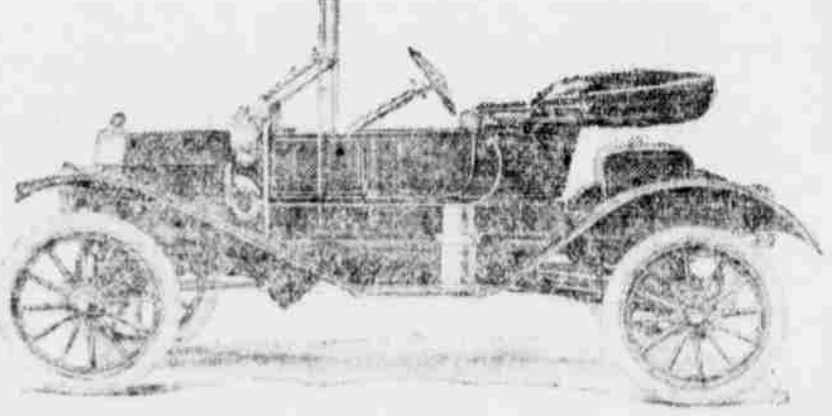
