

BLUE AND GOLD TRAILED IN DUST

Stanford Wins Both Races From California at Annual Regatta—Freshmen Easily Row Away From California "Baby" Team.

OAKLAND, Cal., April 15.—The Cardinal triumphed over the blue and gold in the inter-collegiate regatta held this morning between the University of California and Stanford University freshmen and varsity crews.

The freshman victory was the most impressive, the Stanford youngsters winning by two lengths, while the varsity, after beating the starting gun by a 1-4 of a length, were hard put to win by half a length at the finish. The freshmen covered the three mile course in sixteen minutes flat, while the varsity finished in 14:09 1-5.

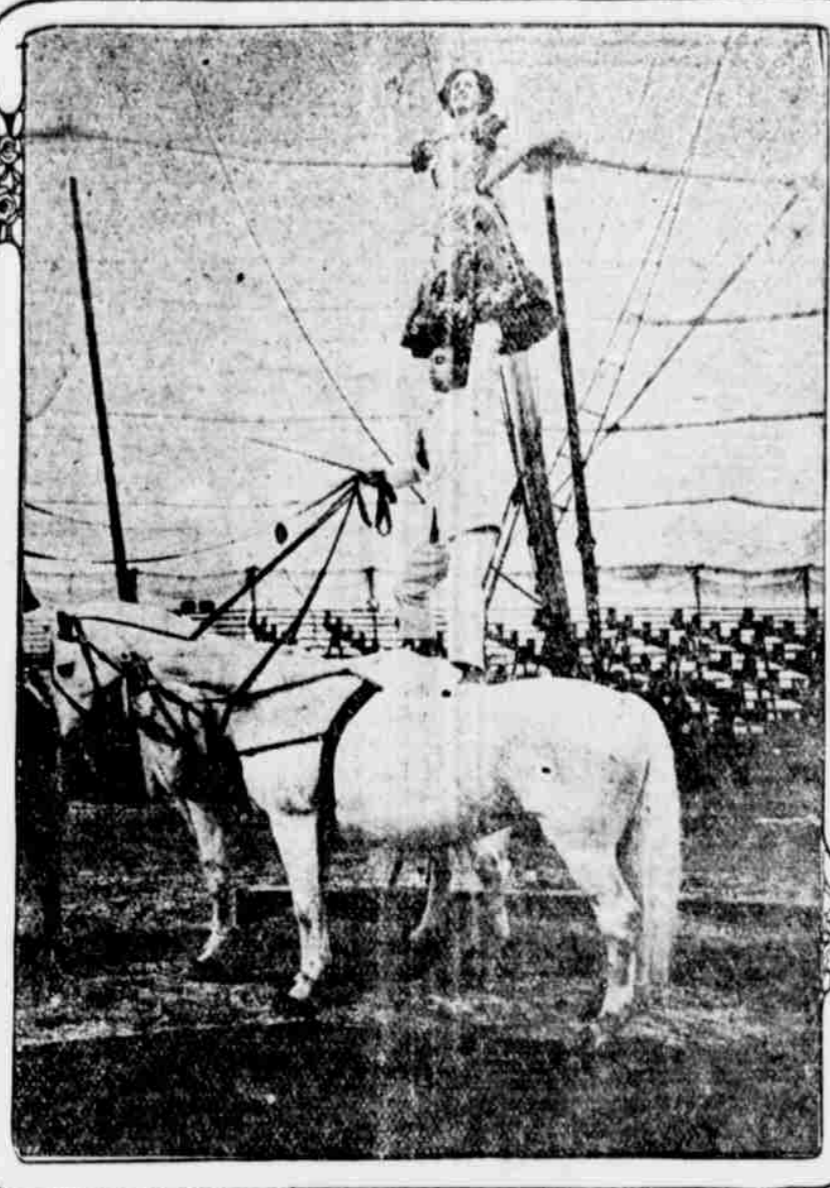
It was an ideal day for the big race, the water being as smooth as glass and thousands of spectators lined the banks of the estuary and the Webster Street bridge, where the races started. The freshmen took the water at 9:17 a. m. Stanford immediately forged to the front, swinging along at a 44 stroke, while the California crew was going at a 40 clip. The Cardinal shell was half a length to the good at the Webster Street bridge, and after going a mile increased the lead to two lengths.

With this advantage the Stanford boys let up a little and rowed at a 36 gait, while the California crew maintained the same stroke. The blue and gold sprinted at the finish and increased their stroke to 42, but Stanford came right back with a 40 stroke and maintained the lead to the end, winning by two lengths.

When the gun was fired for the varsity race the fraction of a second which it required for the sound to carry to the California crew enabled Stanford to get off in the lead. California started with a 42 stroke, against the Cardinals 40, but the Stanford crew increased its stroke after going a short distance and were pulling along at a 49 clip after covering a mile while the California stroke had dropped to 36. Stanford was a length to the good at the mile pole and both shells were going smoothly. After going two miles the Stanford crew was a length and a half ahead, both crews pulling 36.

California made a determined effort to get the lead a quarter mile from the

HENDERSON TO PLAY BASEBALL

Garry Hermann Rules That Star Pitcher of Pacific Coast League Will Be Allowed to Play With Portland Team.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15.—Benny Henderson, star pitcher of the Pacific Coast league, is to be permitted to play with Portland. Ruling of Garry Hermann of the national commission to this effect was received by President Graham of the Pacific league today.

The message from Hermann said that an order had been issued to Secretary Farrell of the National Association of Professional Baseball clubs that Henderson must be placed in the same category with Tommy Sheehan and other players who jumped the state league and that Henderson must be permitted to play in the Pacific Coast league until his term of "ineligibility" shall have expired.

This means that Henderson is eligible to play with Portland, from which team he jumped. His term of "ineligibility" will expire with this season.

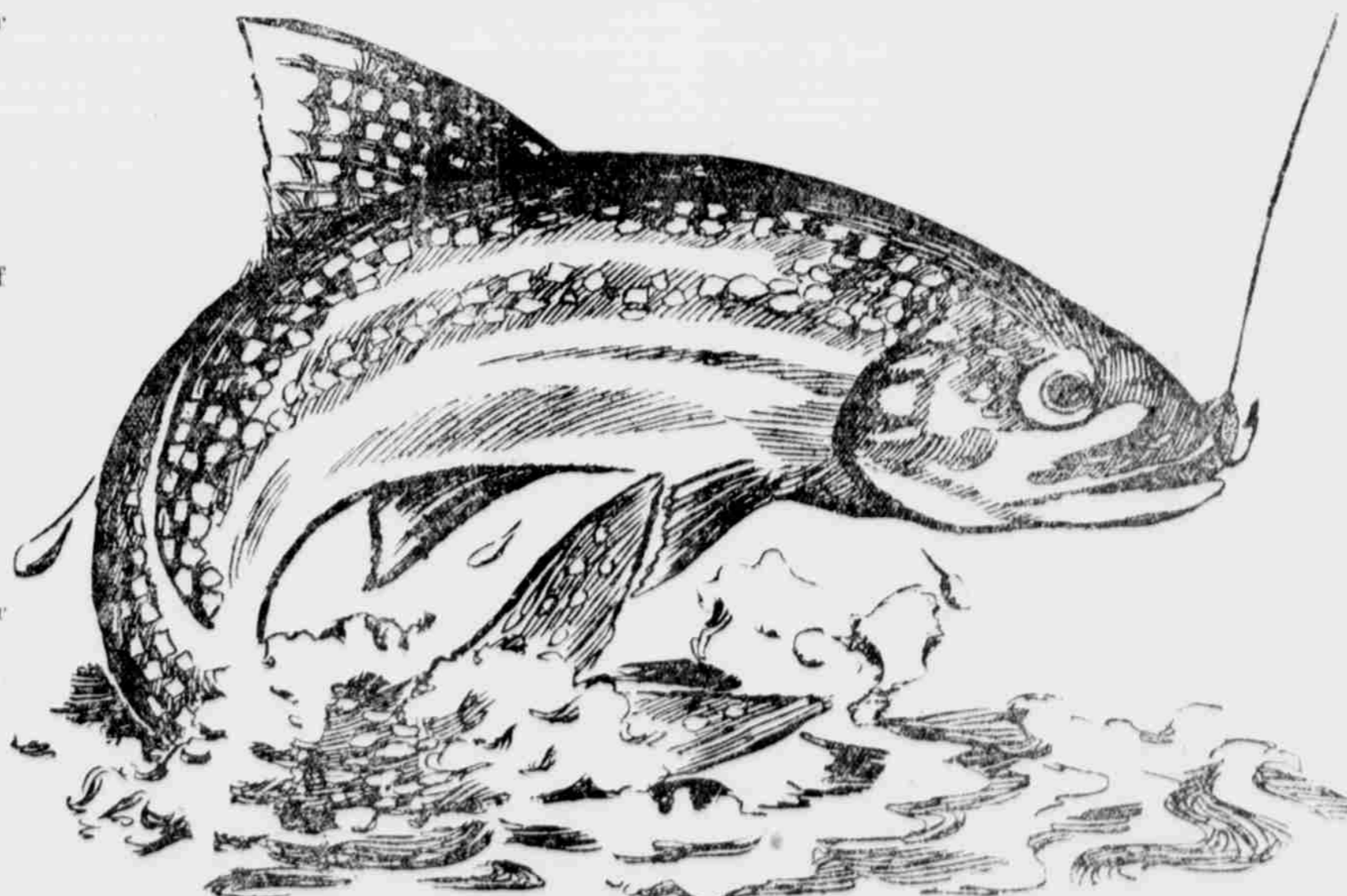
