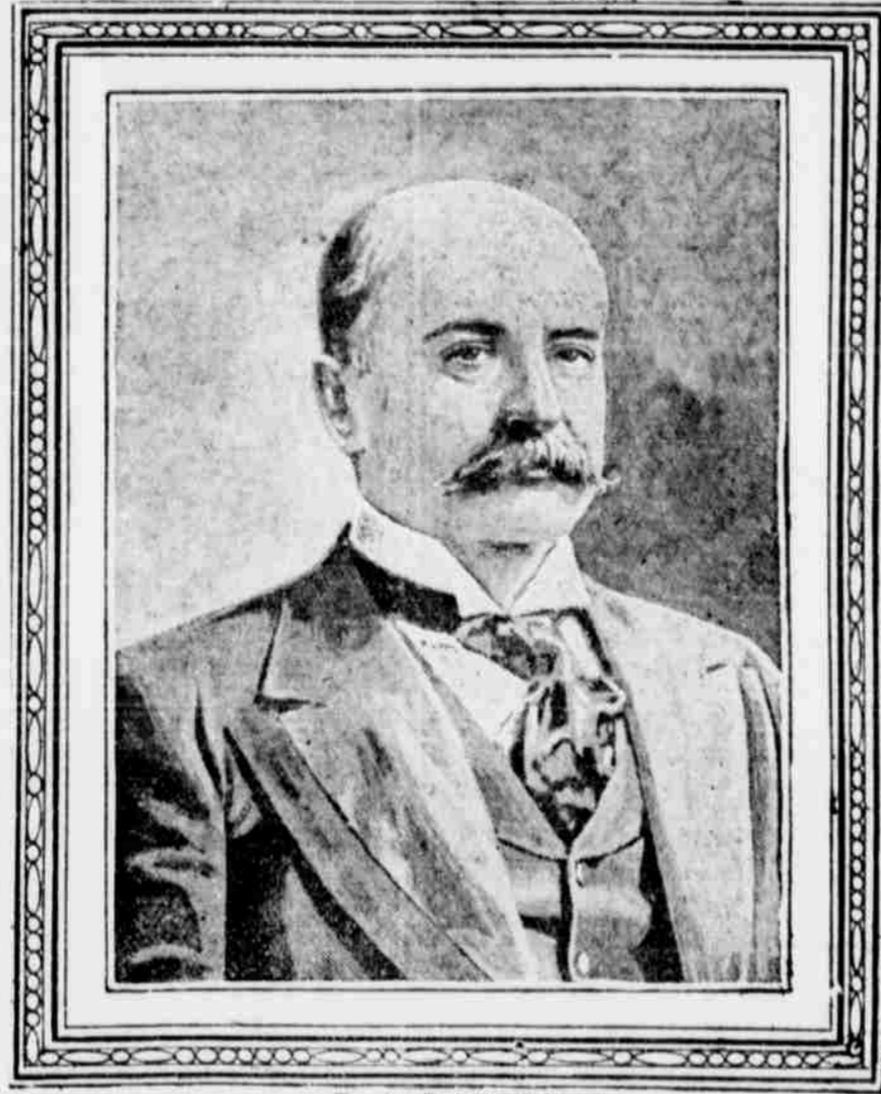
Rev. Day was chosen delegate from the church here to the Sunday school convention at Eugene which convened this week.

NO FREEDOM FOR JOHNSON

No Order is Issued Freeing Dusky Champion—No Conference is Held by Sheriff and Judge—To Spend Eastern in Jail.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 15.—Jack Johnson went to bed in his cell tonight, his dream of freedom shattered. The promise of Judge Treadwell that the dusky champion would be set free at sunrise Easter morning failed to bring forth any order for the unbolting of the jail doors, and late tonight it appears that Jack was doomed to serve out the remainder of his twenty-five day sentence for speeding. Judge Treadwell today refused to give Johnson's attorney a letter recommending his release and a conference between Sheriff Finn and Treadwell relative to freeing Johnson had not taken place tonight.

TWO MALED INTO COURT FOR DYNAMITING FISH

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., April 15.—Charged with dynamiting fish, Martin Dillon and Thomas Riley were arrested upon complaint of District Attorney D. V. Kuykendall. They were brought before Justice of the Peace Graves Monday afternoon and bound over to await the action of the grand jury.

The charge which the two men face is a serious one, and the punishment is a fine of \$200 to \$1000 or from a month's to a year's imprisonment, or both, for the first offense. The men are employed at the railroad camp near Medford.
