

SMALL FIRE IN RARDON BAKERY

Department Makes a Hurried Trip to Extinguish Small Blaze — Only Little Damage is Done to Building by Flames.

The fire department made a hurried run to the Rardon Peccless Bakery shop Saturday morning to extinguish a small fire. About 5 o'clock one of the employees discovered a small blaze in the dryer above the bake ovens at the rear of the building and turned in an alarm over the telephone, stating that there was a fire at Rardon's. As there are three Rardon stores in Medford some time was lost in determining which store was meant. The portion damaged most was a far papered addition built over the bake ovens. Considerable excitement was caused when it was rumored that the Hotel Moore was ablaze as dense clouds of smoke were seen pouring from the rear of the business block. The damage by water was greater than that caused by the fire. Pouring through the ceiling the water ran into the store room and ruined most of the stock of flour and a considerable portion of the morning's baking was damaged. The second floor is occupied by several families and these suffered some loss to bedding, etc., when the windows were broken by streams of water thrown against them. The spectators had a hearty laugh when the firemen became mixed up in the dryer and were routed by the pouring of heavy streams of water into their midst. One fireman was swept off of a ladder and another was pinned to the wall by a stream hitting him in the small of the back. Prompt action prevented the blaze from spreading into the adjoining building.

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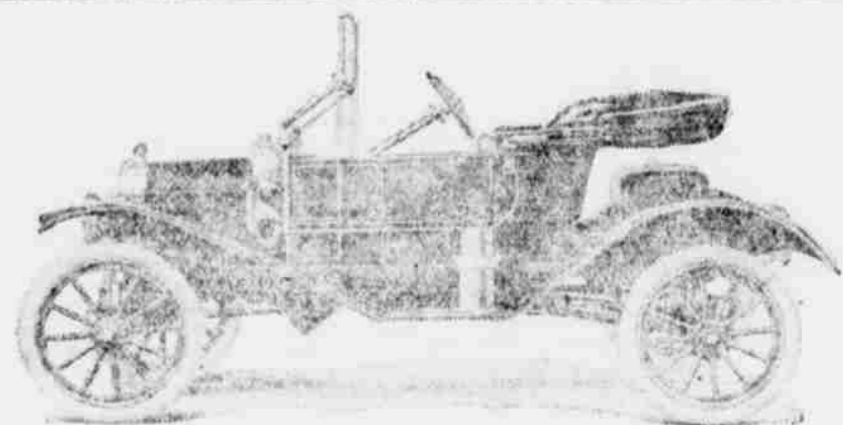
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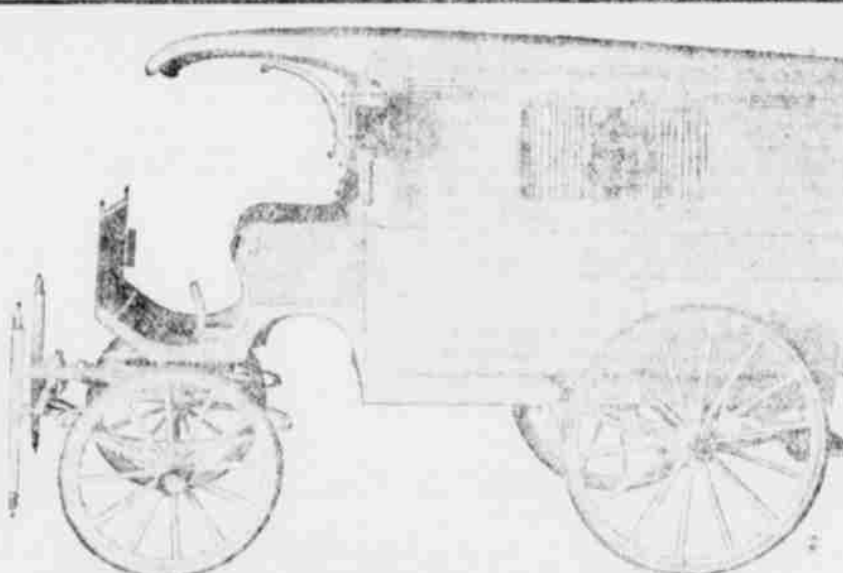
