O. O. Helman of Ashland says this may be a record for Klamath, but t won't stand for Jackson county. He tells us he has a pen of 16 S. C. White Leghorn pullets that began laying i October, 1919, and have continued to iay through the entire winter. They are still at it. Their record for March was 371 eggs. There was no recorkept until December. In that month they laid 205 eggs, in January 245, and in February 301.
