

GREEKS FINED FOR GAMBLING

Three, Convicted of Playing Poker, Are Assessed \$25—Caught in Raid Made Last Saturday Night at Midnight.

Three Greeks, convicted of gambling in the Greek poolroom on North Fir street, were fined \$25 and costs each by Mayor Cannon Monday afternoon.

The proprietor, Tom Tschawak, and three participants were fined, while the case of two other Greeks was suspended.

The men were caught in a raid at 12 o'clock Saturday night and had a full poker outfit on in their possession.

Chief Hittson and Officers Helm, Hall and Cingcade raided the place and found a poker game in full progress.

HAD HEREDITARY DESIRE TO TAKE HER OWN LIFE

OAKLAND, Cal., April 18.—While her nephew, J. Silveira, played gay airs on the violin all through the night, Mary Bettencourt, a domestic, struggled against the hereditary desire to kill herself and end her life.

One of Mayor Mott's automobiles, doing duty at the polls, carried the woman to the hospital, where she told the physicians that at the first opportunity she would tear off the bandages and make death certain.

Some years ago a sister of Miss Bettencourt leaped from a ferry boat and was drowned after having tried carbolic acid without success.
