### ARMORY SITE IS SELECTED

Adjutant General Finzer, Commander of the Oregon National Guard, and Governor West Choose Site in Ashland.

Governor Oswald West accompanied by Adjutant General W. E. Finzer, commander of the Oregon National Guard, spent Wednesday in Medford, Ashland and around the precinct district of the Rogue river valley. At Ashland they selected a lot 32x200, on E. Street between Oak and First as the site for the new armory. It is to be built partly by city, 19000 and state, buying \$1000 for the same. The site is a block east of the Oregon hotel and was picked out from the four offered as being the most desirable lot for the purpose. The building and site will cost \$25,000.

There is no less a wide Medford should not have a military company or two," stated General Finzer. "The city is the most enterprising of all Oregon towns and might just as well as not have a \$25,000 armory. You have the necessary facilities to draw from and Medford should go after it, as of this kind as well as for neighboring towns. It is a distinct advantage to have a post here."

There are at present ten regiments in the Oregon National Guard, though better are full. We are in good condition and have the only artillery in any of the great states. There is a marked revival of interest in military matters at present, and we hope before long to add a third regiment.

"This is the first time I have been through the orchard district of the valley. I came down from Crater Lake with General Mann last fall, but did not have time to see much. I am delighted with what I have seen and greatly impressed with both Medford, Ashland and the valley and its possibilities."

General Finzer was the guest of Colonel Tom Velle in Medford, and the latter was importuned to take charge of the organization of a company here.
