

EUGENE ELY IS TO FLY HERE

World Famed Aviator Will Appear in Exhibition Flight in His Curtiss Bi-Plane—Has Made Big Record Since Former Attempt.

Arrangements have been completed by the Commercial club for an aviation exhibition to be given at the Medford baseball park June 1. Eugene Ely, world famed aviator, will give the exhibition in the Curtiss bi-plane with which he has made phenomenal flights.

On January he set military circles agog with his feat of landing on the deck of the cruiser Pennsylvania in the San Francisco harbor and quite recently made a record for altitude, climbing to a height of 1300 feet above sea level, at Salt Lake city.

S. G. Rayl, representing Mr. Ely, left Thursday evening, after completing his arrangements, for Portland. Mr. Ely attempted to fly here last year but failed, but now with an additional experience Medford is assured of witnessing one of his very best flights.

CITY NOTICES.

ORDINANCE NO. 492.

An ordinance providing for the construction of 6-inch lateral sewer along Stark street from Washington street to Sherman street, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on the property directly benefited thereby and adjacent thereto, and providing a meeting of the council to consider protests against said construction and assessment and the serving of the owners of such property with notice thereof.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the council to cause a lateral sewer to be constructed along Stark street from Washington street to Sherman street, and to assess the cost thereof upon the property directly benefited thereby and adjacent thereto.

Section 2. The council will hear and consider any protests against said construction and the assessing of said property for the cost thereof at a meeting of the council to be held May 2, 1911, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., in the council chamber in said city, and all property owners of property adjacent to said sewer and benefited thereby are hereby called upon to appear before said council at said time and place, and show cause, if any they have, why said construction should not be made and the cost thereof so assessed.

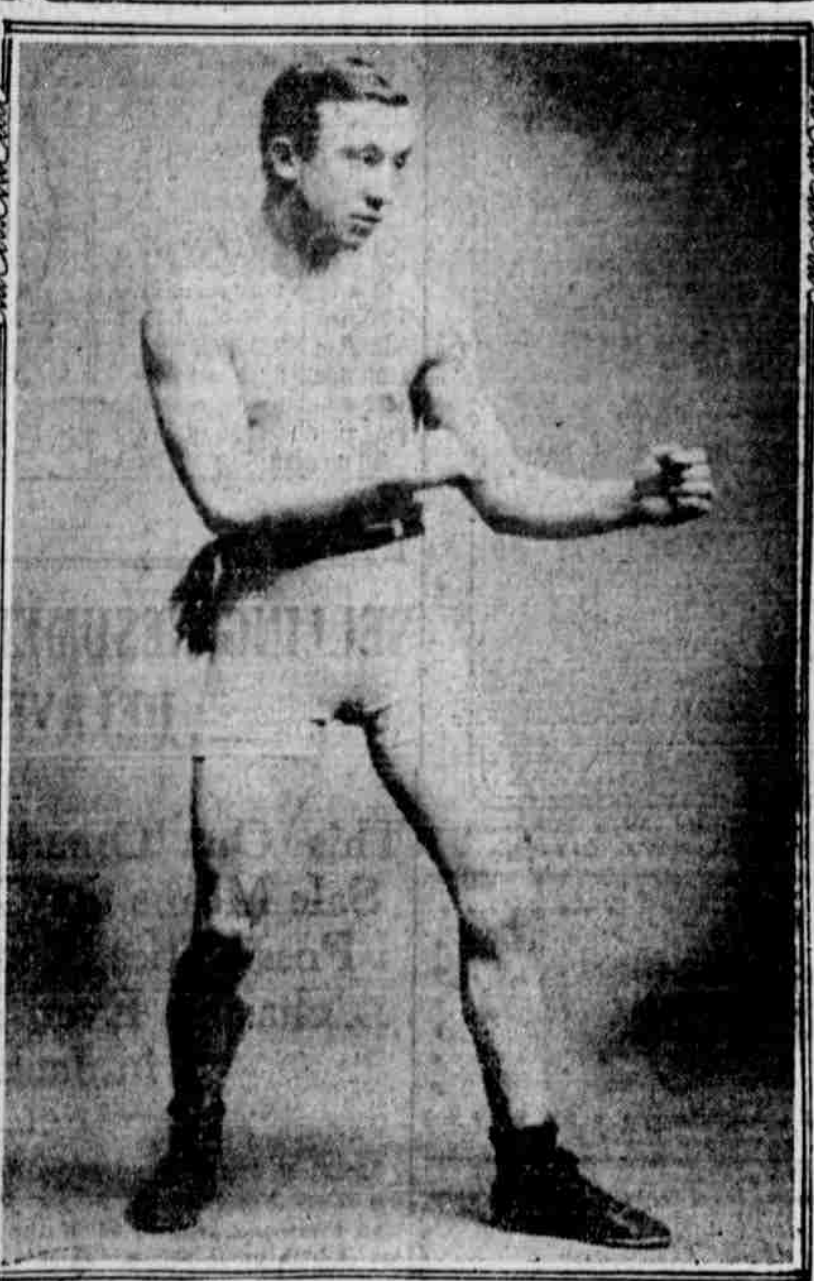
Section 3. The city recorder is hereby directed to serve notice thereof upon the property owners aforesaid, by causing three copies of this ordinance to be posted in three public places in said city, and said ordinance to be published once in a daily newspaper published and of general circulation in the city, at least 10 days before the date of said meeting.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, on the 15th day of April, 1911, by the following vote: Merriek "aye," Watt "aye," Workman "aye," Erick "aye," Elfert "aye," and Miller "aye."
