

CONTRACT FOR SEWERS IS LET

Jacobson Bade Company Agrees to a Five Per Cent Cut in Original Figure—Many Water and Sewer Mains to Be Laid.

A special meeting for the consideration of the Jacobson-Bade company's bid, on sewer and water main, construction was held by the street and finance committee Friday afternoon at the city hall, and a reduction of five per cent on the original bid was agreed upon.

The street committee agreed to leave the matter with the finance committee and as Mr. Watt was absent Aldermen Merrick and Wortman took the matter up with Mr. Bade who acted in the interests of the company. The original bid was as follows:

- For furnishing and laying 6 inch sewer per linen foot \$1.22.
- For furnishing and laying 8 inch sewer, per linen foot \$1.35.
- For constructing standard main holes, each \$55.00.
- For constructing standard lampposts, each \$15.00.
- For excavating rock per cubic yard \$6.50.

BURGLARS ACTIVE SOUTH CENTRAL

Home of Mrs. George Merriman and That of C. T. Noe Are Entered—Bureaus Ransacked—Locket and Clothes Are Taken.

The home of Mrs. George Merriman at 520 S. Central avenue, was entered by supposed burglars Friday afternoon and but for the timely discovery of their presence by Mrs. Claude Miles, a daughter of Mrs. Merriman, considerable loss would have been sustained.

The home of C. T. Noe, 526 South Central avenue was also entered and a valuable locket and chain stolen.

While standing on the back porch of the Merriman home shortly before 2 o'clock Mrs. Miles noticed two men passing on the sidewalk. She lost sight of them as they passed the house, but looking through the screening of the porch she saw only one of the men walk away. This aroused her suspicions, especially as he was looking over his shoulder and motioning as if to some one on the front porch.

Dropping her work she entered the back door and walked to the front hall just in time to meet one of the men entering a bedroom opening from it. The man appeared to be slightly confused but glibly inquired for a gentleman boarding there, stating that he had broken a motorcycle and had been given to understand that a repair man resided there. The explanation appeared plausible to Mrs. Miles who thought no more of the matter until later. She noticed, however, that the man walked to the home of Mr. Noe, 526 South Central avenue and entered that house, first knocking and then stepping inside.

Later in the afternoon Mrs. Noe, who had been out calling, returned and noticed the screen door open. Thinking something out of the ordinary had happened she made a hurried search of the rooms finding the bureau drawers all open and a locket missing. She ran to the Merriman home and inquired if anyone had been seen entering her house and upon learning of the afternoon's happenings Chief Hiltson was notified and a search instituted.

The man who entered the Merriman home is described as being tall and slender, well dressed in dark colored clothes and polished in his speech, while his companion was short and stocky and wore a blue serge suit. No trace of these men has been found and it is doubtful if anything can be proven if they are discovered.

Housewives have complained considerably of hobos hothering them with requests for clothing of late, but this case is the most satisfactory of any yet recorded. From their appearances, however, these men were not of this type but were of the class known as "gentlemen-burglars." A vigorous search is being made for them but they are thought to have left the city.

REALTY ASS'N MAKES GAINS

New Office is Opened in Mail Tribune Block—Ample Room is Furnished—Commercial Club May Meet There.

The Medford Realty Association is now at home in its permanent quarters in the annex to the Mail Tribune building on North Fir street. The large room in the rear part of the second floor has been secured for an exchange office and meeting room, the space being large enough to accommodate any meeting which the association will ordinarily hold. The room is forty feet by twenty eight, with a ten foot balcony outside, extending over the roof of the first floor, and is amply large enough to serve as a club room, should the association determine to add that feature to its present activities. With ample room, the increased facilities for handling the detail work connected with the office, tender prompt and efficient service to its members and to the public. A cordial invitation is extended to owners and prospective buyers to visit the rooms and become acquainted with the workings of the exchange.

The membership list of the association comprises at present twenty eight of the leading real estate firms of this city; property listed for sale with any one of the members is listed, at the owners' option, with the exchange; copies of the description of the property, with price and terms of sale, are immediately placed in the hands of all of the remaining members of the association, and each one of them is authorized to find a purchaser for it. Sale contracts can also be made directly by owners with the exchange office, in which case the same distribution of information is made, and authority to sell given to each of the association members. In either case, an owner receives the benefit of the services of a large majority of the best real estate dealers in the city, at a uniform rate of commission, which has been fixed at five per cent. The property, in all cases, is quoted to prospective buyers at the price fixed by the owner.

The directors of the Commercial Club will hold their postponed meeting for the consideration of the election of a successor to Manager C. A. Malboeuf in the exchange rooms on Tuesday evening of this week, the use of the room having been tendered to them by the directors of the Realty Association. The regular semi-monthly meeting of the Commercial Club will also be held in the exchange rooms on Wednesday evening of this week. The association has placed its quarters at the service of the Commercial Club until the latter organization is able to make permanent arrangements for a meeting place. As the exchange room is amply large enough for the purpose, it is not unlikely that some permanent arrangement will be made which will enable the Commercial Club to use the room through the year.

Wants Patrick Pardoned. NEW YORK, April 22.—In the hope of securing a pardon for Albert T. Patrick, serving a life term in Sing Sing for the murder of millionaire William Maxwell Rice, a brother-in-law, John T. Milliken of St. Louis, has engaged counsel to appear before Governor Dix next Monday. Patrick, who is himself a

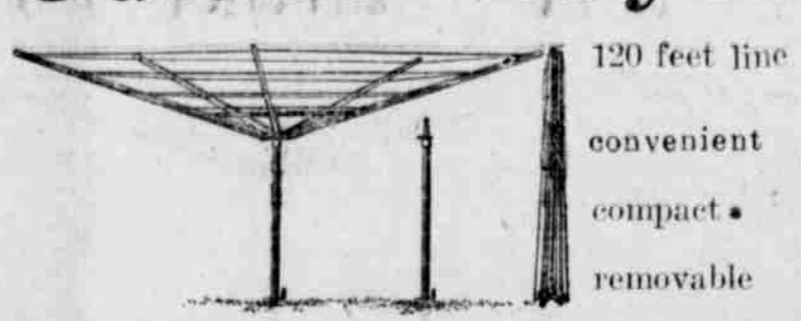

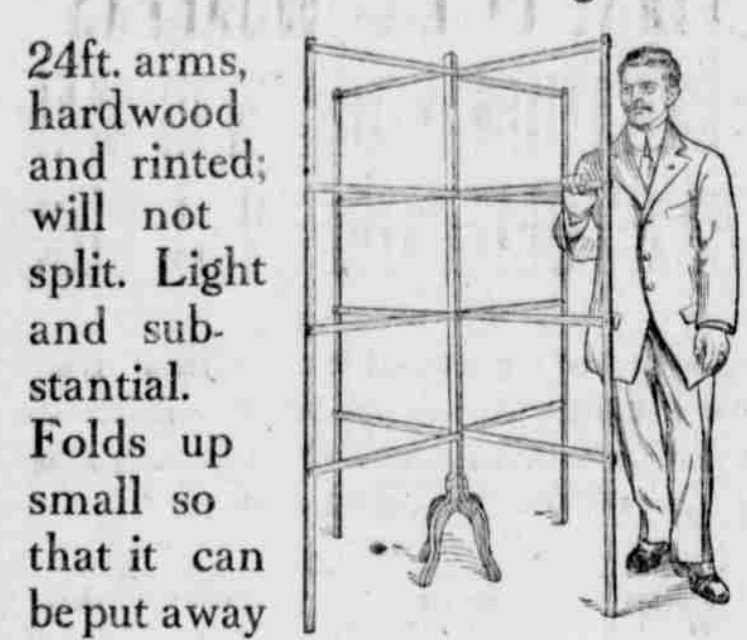
