#### To Try Wireless Officials.

NEW YORK, April 22.—In the United States circuit court today Col. Christopher Columbus Wilson, president, and other officials of the United Wireless Telegraph Company appeared to answer for alleged misuse of the mails in a plan to defraud. The charges grew out of the sale of great quantities of stock in the company.

Col. Wilson is confident that he will be acquitted. Shortly after his indictment last August he married his eighteen year old stenographer, Coy. Wilson is sixty four. He has been held under \$25,000 bail pending trial.

### HOT BALL GAME IS PROMISED

Now that these two teams are evenly matched the interest is intense, as heretofore the games were so one-sided that the fans were always "holding" for some team to play the Medford boys to a standstill. Now they have it, as Grants Pass has a team this year that is in every way the equal of Medford's, and tomorrow's game will be a grueling contest. Manager Hall is yet undecided as to which of his four pitchers he will start the game with. But in all probability it will be either Tamy or Burgess, but Bragdon or McQuoid may go in if they warm up good. This will be the first appearance of Tamy on the local diamond but those who have seen him work say that he has the goods and can make good if he gets the chance. McQuoid pitched the opening game of the Crater Lakes and Bragdon worked in last Sunday's contest against Grants Pass. With this quartette of hummers Court Hall will surely pull a victory out of the scramble. The rest of the line-up will probably be Wilson, C. Wilkinson, H. Horton, B. Miles, B. Chess, S. Hopkins or Roeder, R. Isaacs, C. and Antel, D.

Grants Pass will probably pitch Wilcox, who is rounding into good form and the rest of their line-up will probably be the same as last Sunday. Owen Patton will hold the indicator and the fans may rest assured that they will see a fast and fair ball game. The game will be called at 2:30 o'clock.

#### Discuss Trust Laws.

NEW YORK, April 22.—A committee of twenty-six representing a dozen states will meet here tomorrow to consider a measure for uniform legislation as to combinations and trusts. Proposed amendments or substitutes to the Sherman anti-trust law will probably be considered.

The National Civic Federation also has under consideration a workmen's compensation bill which has all the best features of the Wainwright compulsory compensation act, recently declared unconstitutional by the New York court of appeals. This bill has already been introduced in the legislatures of several states by the state councils of the federation.

#### Southern Printers Meet.

ATLANTA, Ga., April 22.—Employing printers of southern states convened in Atlanta today for a session of three days. Publishers and printers are in attendance from Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Virginia, Louisiana, Tennessee and other states. Prominent members of the United Typothetae of America will deliver addresses and read papers. Methods of establishing the cost of all varieties of printing will be the principal topic of discussion.

#### TO BANISH PUBLIC DRINKING CUPS IN STATE

PORTLAND, Oore., April 22.—Public drinking cups will be banished from the state September 1. The state board of health has issued this order and it applies to public schools, trains, railroad stations and all public places. The ruling of the board is now in the hands of the state printer and will be promulgated within a few days.

Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer, has proof that the public drinking cup vial with the fly as a spreader of diseases. Pneumonia, tuberculosis, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid are transmitted in this way and infection and disease come as a natural consequence. Dr. White believes the use of cups in the city schools is particularly dangerous and gives the health authorities too much to do to check epidemics that get started in that way.

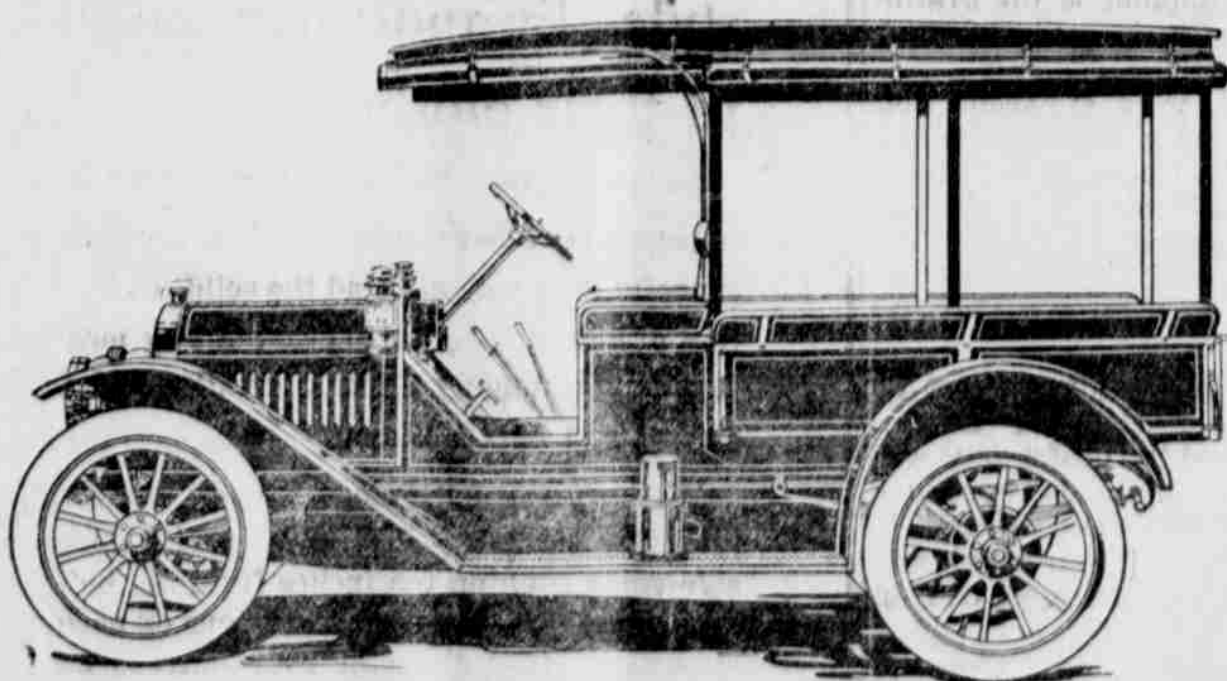

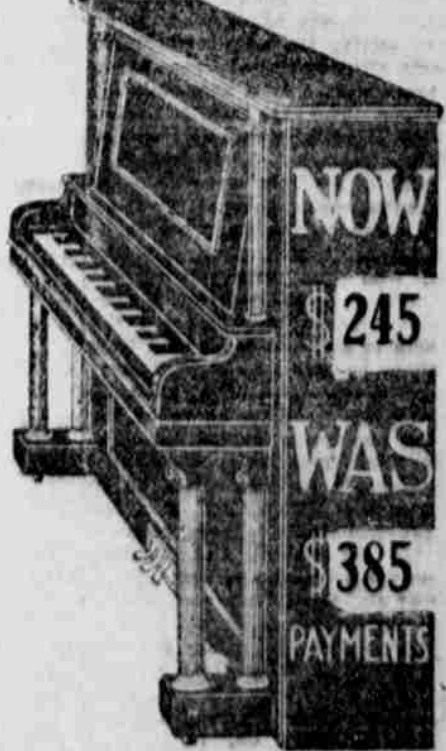
