SMALLPOX IN ALASKA RAGING

Government Stands Firm on Vaccination Order—Steamship Companies Object as Order Hurts Tourist Travel.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 22.—The government is standing firm on its order requiring vaccination of all passengers before landing at Alaskan ports, owing to the prevalence of smallpox in the northwest. Telegrams of protest sent to Washington by steamship officials, who charge that the summer tourist trade to Alaska will be killed, will avail nothing, in the opinion of Dr. B. J. Lloyd of the marine hospital service. He said conditions in Alaska call for vaccination and he does not see any hope of lifting the rule before July 15. Passengers, he said, are submitting and he has met with little trouble in enforcing the order.

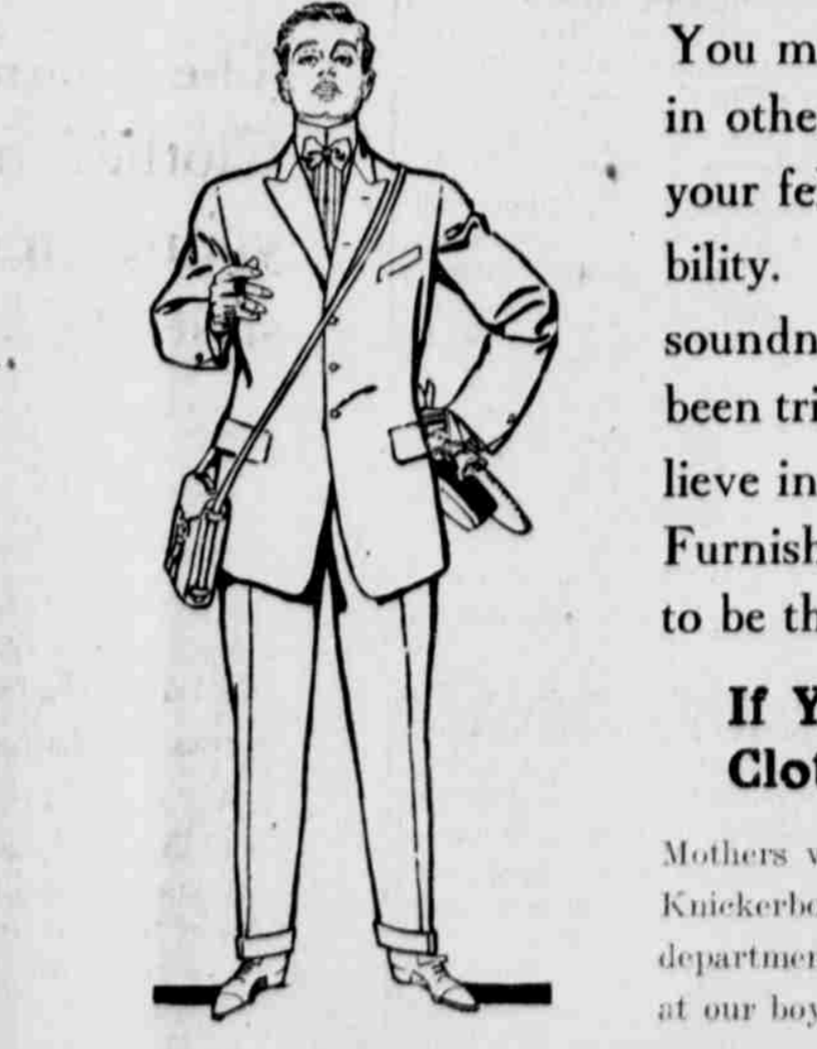
