Of late considerable bad feeling has developed over the labor question and a member of the city council recently went on record with a protest against the UNIONS WIN BIG one of the concerns employing a large number of these foreigners was dropping them fro the pay role, one by one, and employing American labor in their stead.

The sentiment against these people has become so strong that even the business men are protesting and many petty depredations have been committed that have been attributed to them, in some cases with just cause,




