

WHITE LABOR ONLY IS SLOGAN

Greeks and Italians Are Told to Be on Their Way—Local Contractors Are Employing Americans in Preference to Foreigners.

Every laboring man in Medford wore a smile Saturday when the report, that foreign labor was being done away with, was circulated about the city. A number of firms in the city depend on common labor have steadily refused to employ Greeks, Italians and other foreigners, but one or two of the larger companies have been forced to employ them or did so for economical reasons.

Of late considerable bad feeling has developed over the labor question and a member of the city council recently went on record with a protest against the evil. This morning it was rumored that one of the concerns employing a large number of these foreigners was dropping them from the pay role, one by one, and employing American labor in their stead.

The sentiment against these people has become so strong that even the business men are protesting and many petty depredations have been committed that have been attributed to them, in some cases with just cause.

Work cannot be furnished to all laborers who wish jobs but they can be assured that they will be given first choice for any opening in the future.

UNIONS WIN BIG VICTORY IN SOUTH

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 22.—A complete victory in their strike of eleven months was served by the brewery workers and the bottle workers of Los Angeles today when the Mathie Brewing Company followed the example of a large brewery and signed with the unions. The new contract gives the unions every concession for which they struck. It holds good for one year.

The Los Angeles and the Maier Breweries signed last week and the Union Brewery of Anaheim, the only remaining firm which with a contract has not been signed, is expected to follow early next week.

BIG MAJORITY FOR RECIPROCITY

House Passed Measure By Vote of 264 to 84—Believe This Majority Will Have Effect On Senate and Pass Bill.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 22.—Friends of the reciprocity program with Canada are mightily encouraged here today through the showing made in the house by the measure. They believe the vote in its favor of 264 to 89 will impress on the senate that the time has come to cease obstruction and to chime in with the lower house.

In all, the democrats defeated thirty-four amendments before the bill was passed. Most of these were attempts to embarrass the reciprocity plan by additions to the farmers free list.

County Commissioners Let Contract for Road on Upper Rogue River—Will Cost 2250 a Mile to Build—Great Improvement.

The county commissioners court has let the contract for the building of the county road from Derby to Rogue River to Maney Bros., who were the only contractors. Their bid was \$2250 a mile. Work is to start at once.

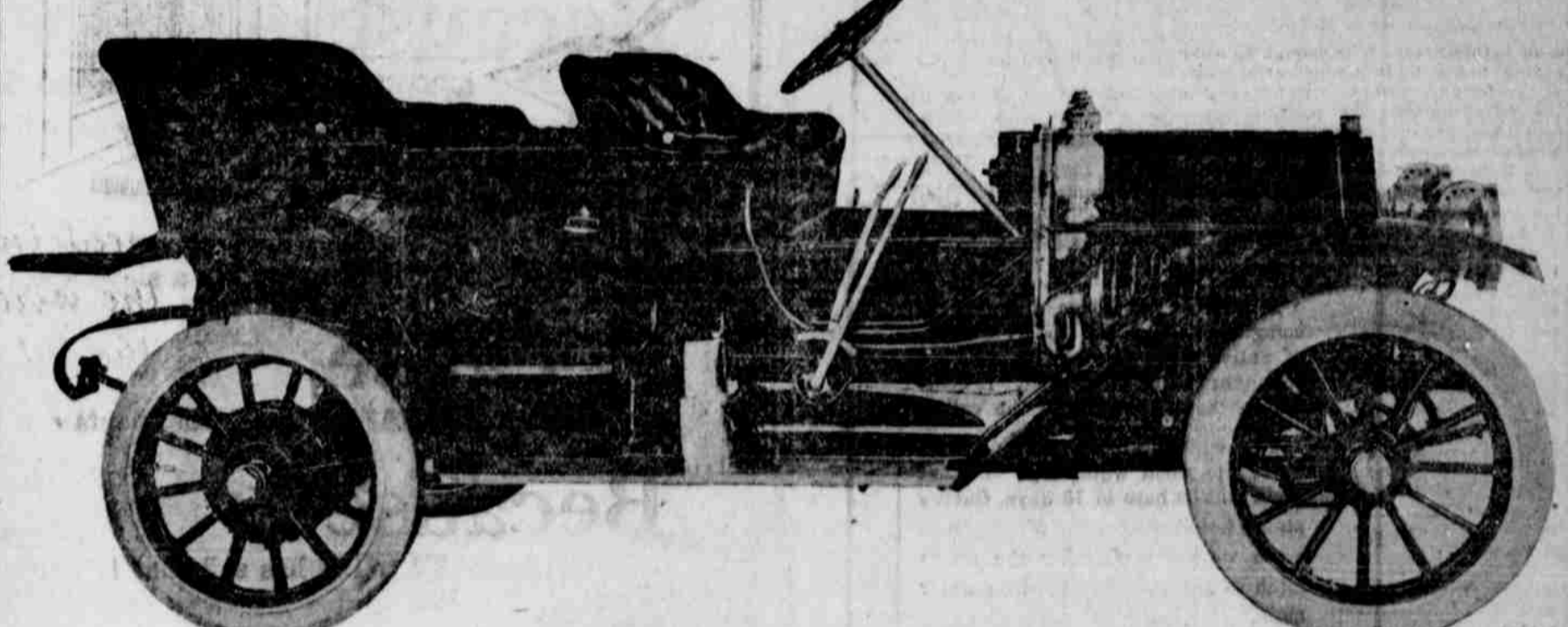

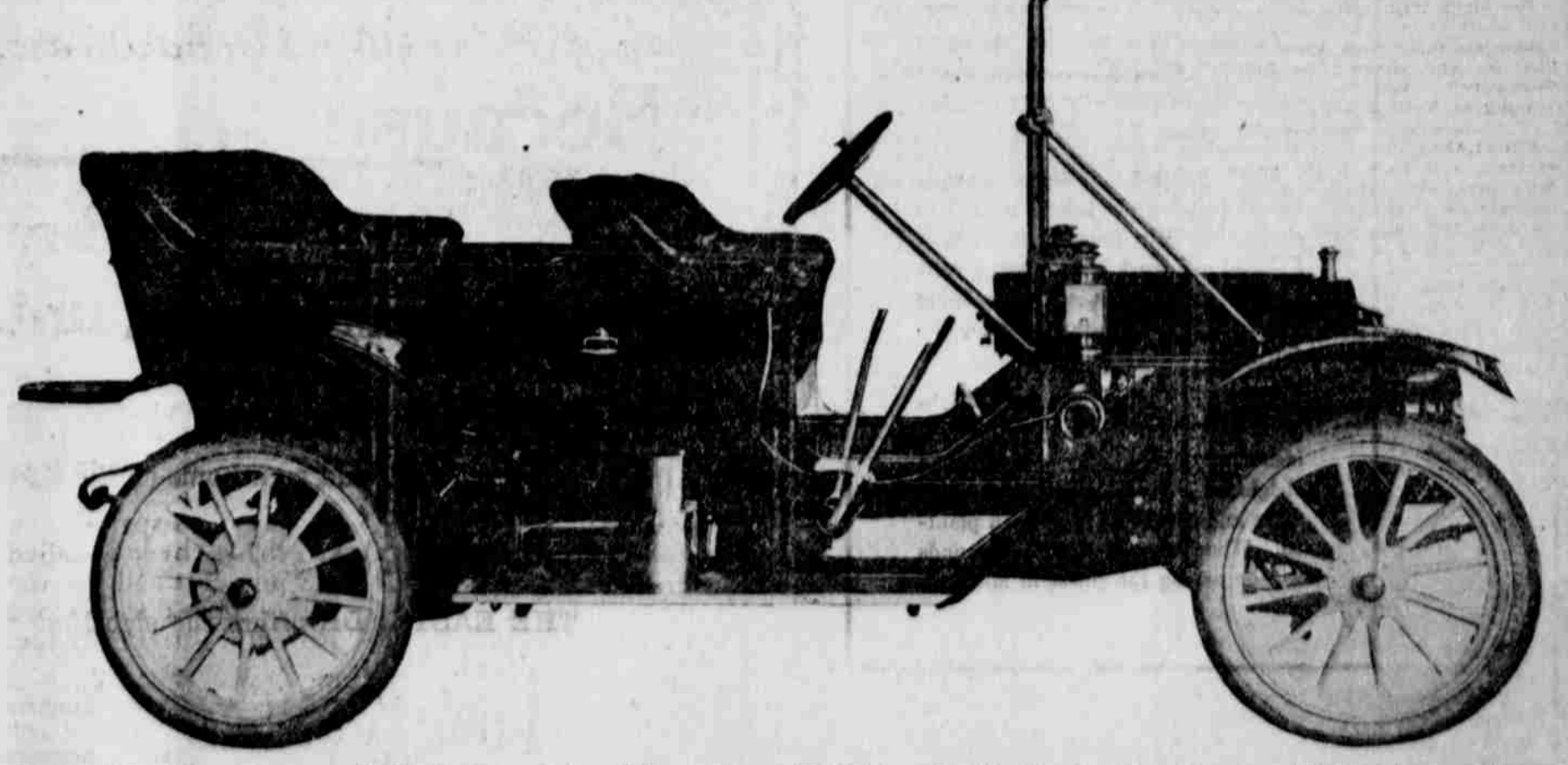
