GOVERNOR WILL REVIEW CADETS AT TOURNAMENT

CORVALLIS Ore., April 25.—The annual military tournament of the Oregon agricultural college cadet regiment will be held Friday, May 5, at the college armory. Governor West will review the regiment and Captain Laubach of the United States general staff will make his annual inspection. It is expected that the special rates offered by the railroads will bring a large crowd of visitors to be entertained by the college throughout the day and evening. The program is as follows: 9 to 12 a. m. inspection by Captain Laubach on the campus; 2 to 2:30 p. m. review by Governor West on the campus; 2:30 to 3:50 p. m. company competitive drills for the Brodie banner and Chambers cup, including musical drill by entire regiment, wall scaling events, equipment and obstacle races, individual competitive drills and officers' sabre drills; 4 p. m. baseball game, University of Washington and Oregon agricultural college; 7:30 to 9 p. m. military exhibition in the armory; 9 to 12 p. m. annual military ball in the college gymnasium.

Fight Over Valuation.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 25.—Testifying in a rate case before the state railroad commission at its session in Spokane, Jap P. Graves, president of the Spokane & Inland Empire Electric Railway system, controlled by the Great Northern Railway company, announced that the actual value of the property is \$24,000,000, as against a physical valuation of \$15,414,357, reported by the commission's engineer. He declared that the commission's appraiser's valuation of a tract of land in Spokane, owned by the company, was too low at \$3,198,290, as it is worth fully \$5,000,000. The company's capitalization is placed at \$21,250,000. Mr. Graves added the company is ready to award a contract for an electric line down the Spokane river to the Columbia river, also that the main lines will be extended to Lewiston, Idaho and Walla Walla, Wash., respectively, 147 and 204 miles from Spokane. The electric plant at Nine Mile, capable of developing 20,000 horsepower, he said, has an annual output valued at \$1,000,000, the production costing less than 20 per cent of that amount.

Drifts Out Into Lake

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 25.—George Clough, a 14 year old lad, had a very narrow escape from drowning in Lake Ewauna during the high wind here. The boy was out at the mouth of Little river early in the morning fishing. He was in a small rowboat and not intending to get very far from the wharf only had a small piece of board for a paddle. The wind came up very suddenly and before he realized his danger the boat had been blown into the current of the river and, aided by the wind, was drifting rapidly down the lake. He had drifted nearly a quarter of mile when his plight was discovered and a launch went out and picked him up. The waves had drifted over the top of the boat and it was rapidly filling when he was taken into the launch.

Mrs. Jane Orr Dead.

YREKA, April 25.—Mrs. Jane Orr, one of the oldest residents of Siskiyou county, died Saturday at Ontario, where she had gone for medical treatment several weeks ago. She was 72 years of age and is survived by four sons and one daughter, all grown.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25.—Labor Commissioner McLaughlin scored his first win here today in the fight to enforce the child labor law in San Francisco when Police Judge Treadwell fined the firm of Sporney, Davis & Luckaschewski \$50 for employing Jennie Hopkins, 15 year old, without a school permit.
