

### CAN HANDLE ANY WOMAN

OAKLAND, Cal., April 26.—That he was able to subjugate any woman in Oakland and force her to do his will was the statement attributed to the witness stand today to Dr. A. E. Byron, who was tabbed by Chase Patrick a few weeks ago after a quarrel with the latter over his daughter, Frances Patrick.

The physician's alleged statement came out today in the testimony of Detective McSorley in the preliminary examination of Patrick. The officer stated that before the assault Patrick tried to get the police to break up the alliance and reported that Byron held the girl under the influence of either drugs or hypnotism. When asked to leave the girl alone, according to Patrick, the doctor boasted over the telephone to the girl's mother that he was able to subjugate any woman in the city.

The case was continued until tomorrow.

Byron, who is married, had lived with Miss Patrick for several weeks before the stabbing. The father tried to persuade the doctor to stop this act, failing, stabbed him. Byron for several days was close to death.

### GOD OF LOVE ROUTED BY AN IRATE FACULTY

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 26.—"Dan Cupid" today is in hiding at the Margaret Morrison Carnegie school, the woman's branch of the Carnegie Technical schools. The puppy love market is on the decline, say the professors, and one pretty girl, suspended for falling in love, is bemoaning an unkind fate which impelled her to write to a newspaper for advice in love matters.

An instructor seemingly was interested in the "advice to the lovelorn" column of the newspaper also, for he was perusing the page when he ran across a letter from a "Tech" girl, in which she described herself minutely and told of her love affair with a young student. She signed the missive M. M. C. S., the mystic letters standing for the school.

The faculty met immediately; the girl was given a third degree examination. She confessed, was penalized and the god of love took to the woods.

#### Eloper Nearly Century Old.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 26.—Not waiting for June B. H. Bailey, aged 93, and Mrs. Martha Griffin, aged 48, of Sylvania, have eloped and become man and wife. A friend went to Mountainview and obtained the license, which the groom feared might be refused to him. Bailey is a well preserved man for 93 years, retaining his hearing and eyesight.

### ROAD WORK IS WELL UNDER WAY

A carload of horses and mules were unloaded Wednesday for Contractor Powell, who has taken a sub-contract for Maney Bros., on the Derby-Rogue river road, contract for which was let last week. The work will be rushed through to completion.

The Columbia Bridge Company has let the contract for 70,000 feet of lumber for the new bridge at the mouth of Big Butte creek to the McClanahan mill. The sand and gravel can be obtained on the spot and work is being rushed.

Contractor Natwick on the Crater Lake boulevard, building the grade around Pannoe Hill, has secured fifty laborers from the Pacific & Eastern railroad and now has a force of 200 men making the dirt fly.

### HAYES TO DEFENSE OF JOHN McNAMARA

TACOMA, Wash., April 26.—J. W. Hayes, secretary-treasurer of the International Typographical union, enroute to San Francisco from Indianapolis, to arrange for the annual convention of the union to be held in August, today discussed the arrest of J. J. McNamara in connection with the Los Angeles Times.

"I simply cannot believe that McNamara or the other men arrested can be guilty of the charges made against them," said Hayes. "I have known McNamara for several years in Indianapolis and it is simply beyond comprehension to think that a man of his character could conceive or permit knowingly such a crime.

"McNamara is a big jovial, good natured man, well liked and popular. I know nothing more about the case than has appeared in the papers, but there appears to me to be a number of discrepancies in the various stories and the action of the authorities in kidnaping the men wanted. If they have in their possession the proof they claim to possess, it seems to me they have no reason for such action."

#### Steel Sells Heavily.

NEW YORK, April 26.—Today's stock market opened with United States steel selling heavily. On the first sales it declined half, but later recovered. Great Northern preferred rose a point and Wisconsin Central 1/4. Union Pacific, Reading and other favorite stocks sold fractionally above yesterday's closing level. The market closed strong. Bonds were firm.

### OLIVER TWIST'S CRY IS USED

WASHINGTON, April 26.—Selection of Jonathan Bourne, senator from Oregon, for a place on the committee on appropriations, by the senate committee on committees today failed to placate the progressive republican senators and the executive session of the committee ended abruptly today.

The progressives' demand for greater representation, they later announced, would be taken up in the caucus later in the day and, if their demands are not granted, they will be brought up on the floor of the senate tomorrow.

At the caucus late this afternoon the progressives will insist on places for La Follette on the interstate commerce committee; for Bristow on the foreign relations committee, and for Cummins on the committee on finance.

### SAYS JAPAN IMMIGRATION WILL COST COUNTRY WAR

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26.—"Unless the immigration of Japanese ceases it is going to cost the United States a war, the extent of which cannot be estimated or described." Following his declaration by George Bonham at a meeting of the Asiatic Exclusion league propaganda, started today here to gain support for the exclusion bill presented in congress by Representative Hays of California.
