Timbermen Help State Official in Effort to Reduce Losses—Cruiser Issues His Dope in Novel and Interesting Style.

Elliott, with the hope of greatly reducing the state's loss from conflagration this year.

APPLE BLOSSOMS FOR MAY BRIDES

Spokane Man Suggests Substitute for Time-Honored Orange Blossoms—Plan Meets With Much Favor in Apple Districts.

SPOKANE, Wash., April 27.—Fragrant apple blossoms will supplant the time-honored orange flowers as wreaths for May brides, if the plan worked out by Samuel Glasgow, secretary and manager of the Continental Mill company of Spokane meets with as much favor in the apple districts of the United States as it has in this city. He contends that, as the apple blossom is the national flower and marriage is woman's most important step in life, the two should go together. "I have discussed the question with the Spokane chamber of commerce and the Spokane Horticultural association," said Mr. Glasgow, "and through them we are in hopes of interesting every community in the western country and the apple districts east of the Rocky mountains in the movement. The commissioners of the city and county of Spokane are enthusiastic over the plan. Rev. Dr. Will A. Betts, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, says he will perform the ceremony free of charge, for the first bride decked with apple blossoms appearing at either his parsonage or church. "I have also interested the owners of commercial apple orchards in the Spokane valley and other parts of this country in the movement and expect to announce a substantial prize in a short time for a photograph of the best house or church wedding decorations fashioned with apple blossoms. Personally, I will present a purse of gold to the bride winning the first prize. This competition is free and open to every woman in the United States and Canada. "There is likely to be some opposition from the orange growers, who may feel they have a monopoly on the wedding wreath flower, but I do not believe it will be very serious, as the life of the apple blossom is not more than 30 days in the spring, after which orange blossoms may be worn by bride and bridegroom."

BARNES' ANIMAL SHOW MAKES A HIT.

(Daily Californian.) Without doubt the best attraction, delighting both young and old, that has yet visited Bakerfield is the Barnes' wild animal circus. The circus reached here early this morning and the work of unloading over 20 cars was carried out rapidly and systematically, as was the work of pitching the large main tent and a number of smaller ones comprising the circus.

The feature of the whole was the quiet and orderly way in which everything was done. A large crowd attended this afternoon, taking in the side show previous to entering the big tent for the main performances. It is safe to say that the Barnes circus is unique in that the many species of wild animals are the actual performers, and do what the human beings do in the ordinary circus, the most wonderful thing being that their different turns are the result of infinite care and patience, making these accomplished animals all the more valuable.

The tent contains the cages for the animals and three rings, one of which is in the form of a steel cage, where the elder performances take place. One could not help noticing how well kept and fed all the animals were, and what splendid specimens, all being comparatively of a young age and in the pink of condition. The beasts had the fire of the jungles in their eyes.

The whole performance is excellent, elephants going through amusing antics, bears with savage eyes going through various tricks. Groups of highly trained Arab ponies, goats and dogs riding, galloping ponies are some of the wonderful things done. Perhaps the best part of the whole, and the most wonderful of all, was the performance of Captain Stonewall's train sea lions. These strange animals went through the most surprising tricks, balancing and juggling acts, combined with baseball and other acts of skill that a human being would find most difficult to essay. The performance of the leopard, tigers and lions was most exciting, these ferocious beasts at times showing their latent savage nature, snarling and growling to be pacified the next moment by their trainer.

On one act a charming, yet a mere strippling of a girl, Miss Martha Florine of Paris, put these animals through many tricks, showing her skill and complete control over them. The sight of lions, tigers, leopards and panthers, goats, seals and dogs, all riding, galloping horses, was a new and exciting spectacle. Millie Barnes and Trainer Kelly in the lions' act showed what training will do to a wild beast. The climax of the whole was when Kelly entered the cage of the untamed, man-eating lion, Caesar, for a few moments, dodging the murderous paws, and bloodthirsty jaw of this wild monster.

Another fine feature was the act of Louis Roth, with his mixed troupe of double striped Bengal tigers and Nubian lions, the kings of the jungle.
