Burns Gives Story.

CHICAGO, April 29.—For the first time since the arrest of John J. and James B. McNamara and Orrie E. McManigal for alleged complicity in the dynamiting of the Llewellyn Iron Works and more than a score of other outrages without promise of immunity or reward, said Detective William J. Burns today. Burns is wroth at charges that McManigal's confession was given with the idea that he would escape punishment.

"The confession, which was written down and sworn to before a notary public," continued Burns, "was made to me at Detective Reed's home in Chicago, April 15. McManigal sent for me and said 'I guess its all off with me' and offered to make a clean breast of everything. I warned him of his rights; that everything he said might be used against him and that he need expect no mercy. He said he wanted to confess for the sake of his wife and children."

Asked for Statement. "However, I did tell the two men that if they knew in their own minds that they had been caught red handed, as I knew, that I would be glad to have a statement from them."

"On April 15 McManigal sent for me. When I saw McManigal he said that he realized that he had the goods on him and his detailed confession followed."

"After confessing to dynamiting the Llewellyn plant, he told me about the blowing up of the Times, were branded as false today by Jailer Gallagher at the county jail. Gallagher declared that no one except his attorneys and the guards had seen or talked with James McNamara since the detectives landed him in the jail on Wednesday."

McManigal confessed of his own free will. I explained to him that there would be no immunity or leniency because of his admissions and that I would use his own confession against him.

Burns left for Indianapolis on business connection with the dynamiting cases today. He is expected to return to Chicago Sunday and will then start for Los Angeles.

Baker Story False.

LOS ANGELES, April 29.—Statements that J. H. Baker of the Giant Powder Works had identified James B. McNamara as "Bryce" one of the men who are alleged to have purchased the dynamite to blow up the Times, were branded as false today by Jailer Gallagher at the county jail. Gallagher declared that no one except his attorneys and the guards had seen or talked with James McNamara since the detectives landed him in the jail on Wednesday.

Gumpers to Indianapolis.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Responding to appeals from labor union leaders all over the country, President Samuel Gumpers of the American Federation of Labor decided today to go personally to Indianapolis and there to investigate the history and actions of John J. McNamara, secretary of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, who is now accused of having part in dynamite outrages in Los Angeles and elsewhere. Gumpers will leave for Indianapolis tonight.
