

### BUNGALOW CLUB HOUSE IN PLAN

Board of Directors of New Country Club Meet and Formulate Plans for Betterment of Grounds and Completing Golf Course.

Medford's new country club is now an assured fact and at a meeting of the governors Friday afternoon plans were promulgated for the completion of the golf links and the erection of a club house. A beautifully rolling tract two miles from Medford on the Hill Crest road has been secured and a nine hole golf course will be laid out immediately. There is plenty of room for an 18 hole course and this will probably be constructed later.

The clubhouse will be erected in a knoll in the South East corner of the grounds and will cost in the neighborhood of \$2000. It will be of the bungalow style of architecture and has a unique feature in the veranda, which will be built on the roof and this can be used as a roof garden. A tennis court will also be added and the club will be one of the finest places of recreation in the entire valley. In fact it will be, as far as known, the only Country Club maintained in a fruit growing district and should be an added inducement to anyone looking for a location.

At present there are between seventy and eighty charter members and more have promised to join the organization. A number of those who have joined have not paid their subscriptions and this is holding the work back to some extent but from reliable authority it can be stated that the club is a "go" and not a supposition but it needs the whole hearted support of all the members to come up to the standard wished for by the governors.

Messrs. Leonard Carpenter, R. H. Parsons, and George Dargett were appointed a committee to supervise the work and a tournament is already being planned for Decoration Day. There has been some talk of securing a professional instructor but this has not been definitely decided upon.

The club is to be as near a replica of the foremost country clubs in America, as the finances of the club will permit and will no doubt attract many easterners here who would not otherwise come.

### ELECTION FRAUDS IN ENGLAND TOO

Uninterrupted Series of Contents Follow Last National Election—Both Sides Accused of Gross Corruption and Some Lose Seats.

LONDON, May 5.—Ever since the last English national election there has been an almost uninterrupted series of contents going on in the courts, as a result of charges of corruption at the polls, sometimes by liberals and sometimes by conservatives. Individually none of these contents has been of any great importance. The Liberal-Irish-Labor alliance's majority in parliament is too large to be effected by the unseating of a few of its members, and besides, the unseating has been so evenly divided between the two big parties that it has practically balanced up. What the contents have done, however, is to reveal an immense amount of crookedness in English elections.

The English are a queer people. They are dreadfully shocked when they hear about bribery of voters in the United States. They are always drawing comparisons, very much in their own favor, between political conditions in England and America. They honestly believe that politics are perfectly pure in the former country. And yet they read every day of doings at the polls all over Great Britain that a Tammany ward heeler would shrink from, and it doesn't seem to make any impression on them. In fact, it is of no uncommon thing for an Englishman to turn from a perusal of a newspaper account of the prevalence of corruption, say at Exeter, where H. E. Duke has been trying to get Harold St. Maur's seat away from him on the ground that he won it by bribery, to a discussion of the purity of British election methods.

### PASTOR SAID TO BE BUNCO ARTIST

Divine Charged With Fraud in Suit Involving Coal Lands Worth Two Millions—Writ Goes Forward for Service.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 6.—Rev. Newell Dwight Hills, a divine of Brooklyn, N. Y., is charged with fraud in a suit involving coal lands worth \$2,000,000, situated in Queen Charlotte Islands. The case is brought by Z. M. Hamilton and associates of Victoria against Rev. Hills with James A. Moore of Seattle, and the Western Coal & Iron Company as parties to the suit.

H. W. R. Moore, solicitor for Z. M. Hamilton was granted leave by Justice Clement in chambers to serve a writ out of the jurisdiction of the court on Rev. Hills at Brooklyn and the writ went forward today for service.

### FEAR ATTEMPT TO LYNCH POOL

Mob Spirit Grows in Fowler, Following Report That a Second Body Had Been Found on "Murder Farm"—Officials Apprehensive.

FOWLER, Ind., May 6.—Great excitement prevailed today over the report that evidence of another body besides that of Joseph Kemper was found this afternoon on the John Poole "murder farm" near here, where the Kemper killing occurred. Tonight in this city the mob spirit is growing hourly and the officials fear the jail will be attacked. It is reported that Poole will be taken to LaFayette tonight to get him out of the way in case the threatened lynching is attempted.
