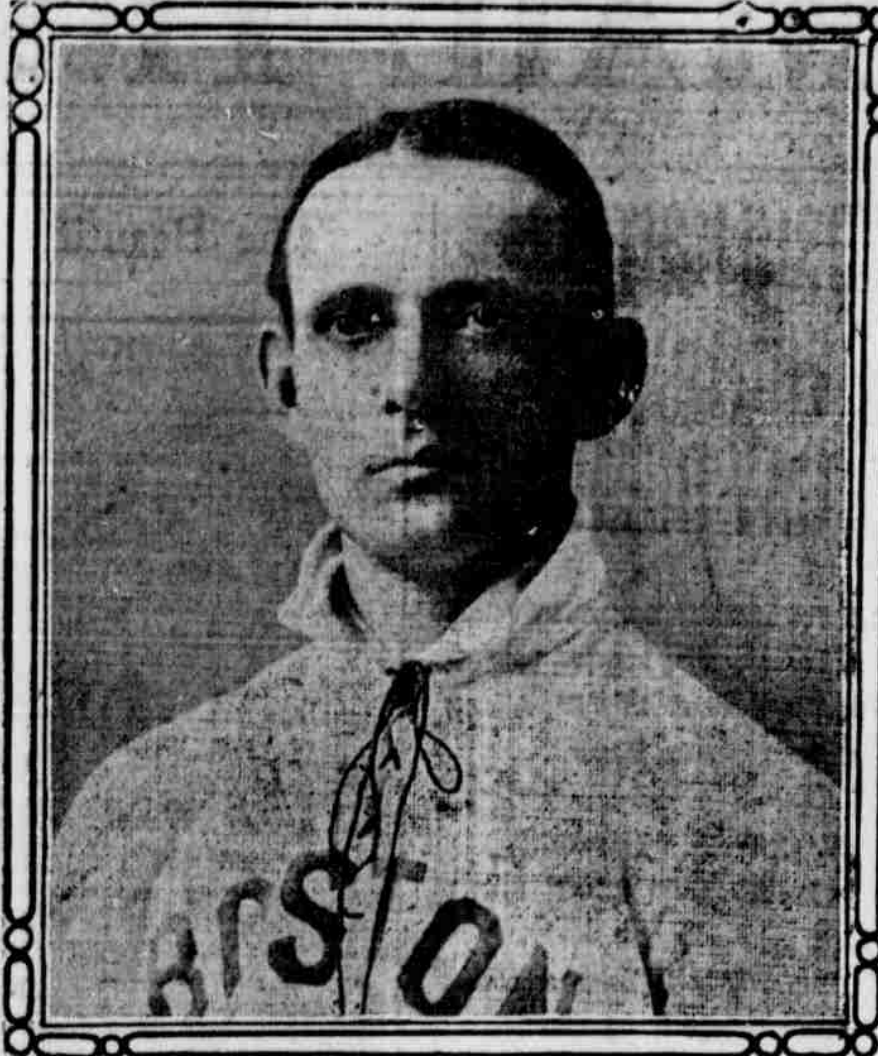

GETTING READY FOR FIRE SEASON

Rangers Busy Repairing Telephone Lines, Brushing Out Trails, Repairing Cabins, and Making Things Ready Generally in Local Forest.

Supervisor Erickson of the Crater national forest reserve is having his hands full directing the operation of the various improvements on trails, corrals and cabins used by the rangers. Two foresters, aided by 15 helpers, are clearing the Crater Lake highway and this will be passable about June 25. Three rangers are at present on the south fork of the Rogue river clearing the Prospect trail, building bridges and fencing several ten acre pastures for horses. Two rangers are at the Lodge Pole station, where they are fencing a 40-acre pasture and building a combined tool-house and rangers' cabin, and still two other rangers are on Steamboat creek in the Applegate repairing telephone wires and trails. The timber sale work takes up the entire time of the office and field forces and about four new men will be added to the field force in the near future.

Laborer Hit by Number 15 Near Woodville is Ground to Pieces— Was Under Influence of Liquor— Head Severed From Body.

The identity of a laborer killed Friday near Woodville on the Southern Pacific tracks by No. 15, southbound passenger train, yet remains unexplained.
