

NO VIOLATIONS AT WEDDERBURN

Master Fish Warden Clanton Reports That Deputy Was Unable to Detect Irregularities at Mouth of Rogue River—Files Monthly Report.

SALEM, Or., May 6.—Master Fish Warden Clanton today submitted his report for April to the board of fish commissioners. He states: "The construction of the fishway at the mouth of the Rogue river, which was authorized by Judge Calkins and mentioned in my report of last month, has since been completed, and Deputy Warden Sandry, who had charge of the work, reports that the fish now have no difficulty in surmounting the obstruction through this ladder as well as through the state's fishway on the opposite side of the river."

"I have also commissioned A. E. Frye as water bailiff for that stream to aid Deputy Warden Sandry in seeing that no net fishing is carried on in that stream. Water Bailiff Frye left Grants Pass for the mouth of the river during the fore part of the month, but has not far been unable to detect any irregularities."

Columbia Peaceful. Mr. Clanton says that, after talking with law-abiding citizens living along the Columbia river and its tributaries, he believes that less violations of the closed season law occurred during the past period just ending than for a number of years past, and that many additional men were engaged to meet any emergency which might have arisen when the state closed the Willamette and Clackamas rivers from April 15 to May 1, but the extra precaution was not necessary, as the fishermen held a meeting on the morning of April 15 and decided, almost unanimously, to abide by the additional closed season period.

The board is also advised that the construction of the Young's river hatchery building on the Clatskanie river will be completed within a few days, and a water supply for hatchery building and retaining ponds will be secured immediately. In his report of hatchery operations, the warden states that on his recent trip to Bonnevillie he saw the thriftest lot of young fish he has ever seen, and that operations at the central station were being carried along with the utmost success.

Racks in Willamette. Inasmuch as it is necessary to secure salmon eggs for the Young's river hatchery, the warden is making arrangements to rack the Middle fork of the Willamette river eight miles above Lowell, in Lane county, and racks will also be installed in the Santiam river, with a view of taking chinook salmon spawn during the coming season. The report shows the receipts for the department for April to be \$19,982, while the disbursements total \$5288.

BARON IN JAIL FOR ISSUING BAD CHECKS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—Much perturbed and showing unmistakable signs of a sleepless night spent in the city jail, Baron von Woellwirth, formerly riding master at Kramer's riding academy, later social lion and patron of exclusive clubs and cafes, who claims to be the scion of a distinguished German family of nobles, was at last today to explain why he had been locked up on a charge of issuing fictitious checks. The baron declared vehemently that the proceedings were absurd. He showed evidences of perplexity because \$40,000 the first installment of an estate he said he inherited in Germany last autumn had not arrived and been deposited in the Hibernian bank to make good a couple of thousand dollars worth of checks which, it is alleged he cashed with no money on deposit. "Baron" von Woellwirth was engaged by Kramer at New York last December. The baron had been a lieutenant in the German army and as a riding master was an expert. He understood horses and women, according to Kramer.

The exchange reports sale of the last car of apples of the season as follows: PFE 8947, from Dufur, Or., April 25, containing 20 different varieties as follows: Choice Winesaps \$1.50, choice Baldwin \$1.40, good Grimes Golden \$1.50, good Red Cheek Toppins \$1.60, choice Northern Spy \$1.40, good Bellefleurs \$1.50, choice Walbridge \$1.50, good Rhode Island Greenings \$1.50, fancy Romanites \$1.75, fancy Commerce \$1.75, fancy and choice Lauvers \$1.75, choice Golden Russets \$1.40, choice Rambo \$1.40, good Black Twigs \$1.60, good Snackelfords \$1.60, good to choice Newtowns \$1.75, choice Rome Beauty \$1.50, choice Peter \$1.50, fancy and choice Ben Davis \$1.50, fancy Senator \$1.60.
