SHORTY BOOSTS FOR HOME TOWN

I. L. Hamilton Says Some Medford People Need Regulating But Outside of That Every Thing is Alright and Flourishing.

"Medford is all right," said I. L. (Shorty) Hamilton today, speaking of the complaints made by a few pessimists that Medford is falling behind in the march of progress.

"I have been away for some time and I think I can see the progress made by the town better than those who have been here for the past few years.

"Hakersfield, Cal., and Willows, Cal., are the only two towns I know of that are progressing as rapidly as Medford. What Medford needs is a carload of 'liver regulators.' There are some people here who are living beyond their means and who are naturally dissatisfied, but the town is all right and will remain so always. It can't go back, but I think will strike a more practical basis short and will be one of the best towns on the coast."

Mr. Hamilton is now making his home in San Francisco, but is an old and well known resident of Medford. He says that business in San Francisco is very dull, as in fact it is all along the coast, and that Medford is getting her full share of business.

SURGEON ORDERED READY TO LEAVE

Dr. E. H. Porter, Retired Army Surgeon, Receives Instructions to Hold Himself in Readiness for Duty With Army in Mexico.

That the United States is contemplating sending its army across the border into Mexico if the situation there does not improve in the very near future is shown by telegraphic instructions from the surgeon general of the United States army received late Saturday by Dr. E. H. Porter of this city to hold himself in readiness for active duty. Dr. Porter just before coming to Medford a year ago, had completed twelve years of service as an army surgeon, leaving it to take up private practice.

If these orders come, Dr. Porter states that he will return to the service but only for the time that the army is engaged in hostilities.

TO DEVELOP LOCAL MARBLE QUARRY

NOTED ACTRESS APPEARS TONIGHT AT THE MEDFORD OPERA HOUSE

MISS NETHEROLE'S ART THE STORY OF THE PLAY

Olga Netherole is one of the few accomplished actresses who take theatre goers on faith. It is a faith born of experience—everyone has seen Miss Netherole do good work in good plays. She matters very little what she plays she is invariably greeted by crowded houses. But this season she has two important plays, "Sister Beatrice" by Maurice Maeterlinck and "The Enigma" by Paul Hervieu.

Miss Netherole was born in England of pure Castilian descent and made her stage debut in a small part in "The Union Jack" at the Adelphi, London, in 1888. Her ability was at once recognized and she was immediately promoted to the rank of the leading-woman. She soon became her own manageress, and produced a series of important plays, many of them from the French. Augustin Daly first brought her to this country and she has divided the last 15 years about equally between America and England. To mention a few of her very big successes, there were "The Notorious Mrs. Ebbelwhite." Two years ago she produced "The Writing on the Wall," a play by a young American author. Early this season, the New Theatre, New York, accorded her the singular honor of departing from its rule of having no star, by starring her in a special production—the first anywhere in the world—of Maurice Maeterlinck's play, "Mary Magdalene." This beautiful play, unfortunately, required a production too costly to be presented anywhere save where the support of a big subscription list, as at the New Theatre, insured tremendous receipts.

This, in very briefest outline, is the career of the celebrated emotional actress who will be seen in this city at the Medford tonight.

MUCH FREIGHT CENTRAL POINT

Cars of Supplies Arriving for Colonel Ray—Many Teams Call Daily and Depart for Prospect With Loads of Machinery.

The Southern Pacific freight yards at Central Point present a busy scene lately due to the fact that many cars of heavy machinery and other material for the big electric power plant being constructed by Colonel Ray and associates at Prospect are arriving and being hauled from there to the destination on wagons. Many teams load and take the road every day for the 45 mile haul and, as there is said to be some 780 tons involved, the work will continue for weeks.

The plant which completed will be one of the greatest in the northwest and will supply electric energy for all of southern Oregon.

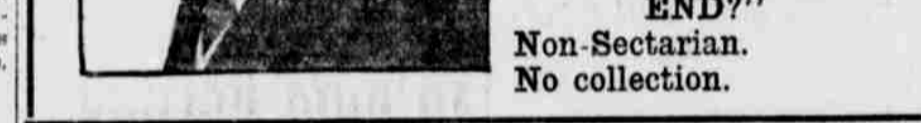
