CITY TAKES IN NEW ADDITION ON THE SOUTH

With but One Dissenting Vote Cast Territory South of City is Voted In—Voters Go to Polls Reluctantly—Only a Few Votes Cast.

MANY WELL KNOWN ADDITIONS ADMITTED

Voting Today on Admission of Territory West of the City—Will Sarrya in all Probability.

The election being held today on the question of annexing much additional territory to the city on the west side is as quiet as the one held Tuesday on the same subject but relating to territory south of the city.

With but one dissenting vote, cast either in the city or in the territory up for annexation, considerable new territory was voted into the corporate limits of the city of Medford, Tuesday.

First—For 15; against 1. Second—For 27; against 0. Third—For 19; against 9.

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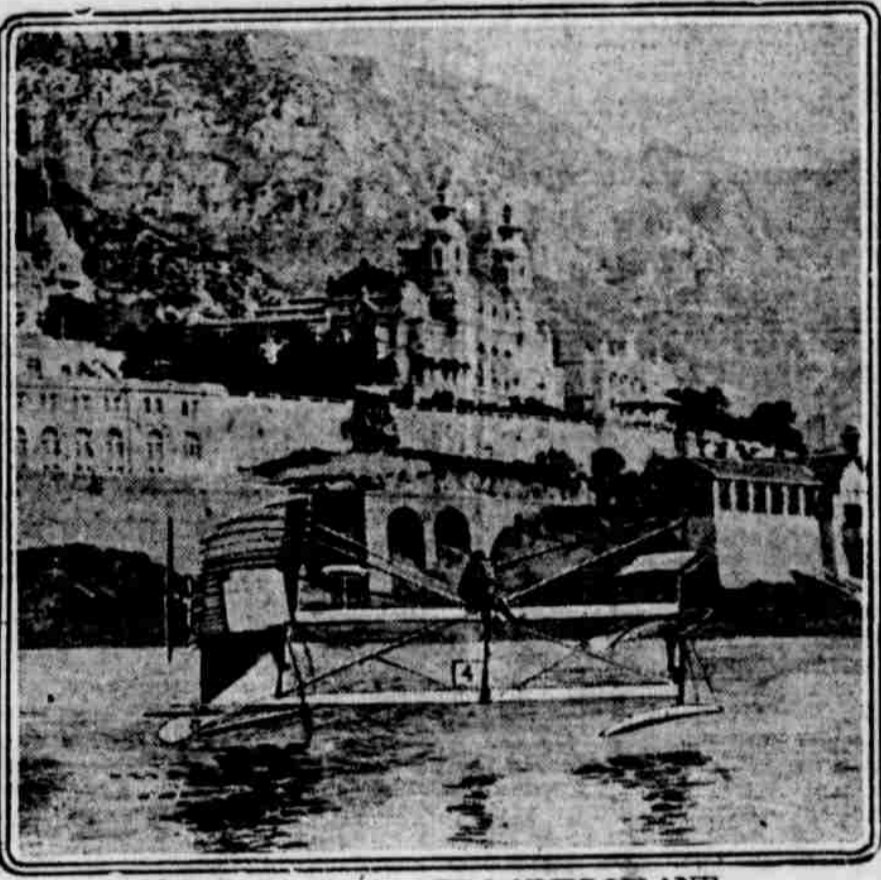
SOCIALISTS DEFEATED IN OAKLAND ELECTION

DECISION SOON SPOKANE CASE

REINFORCEMENTS HAVE ARRIVED AT NOGALES

POWERS TOLD TAFT TO KEEP HANDS OFF

Explanation of President's Unwillingness to Intervene in Mexico is Forthcoming—How Strong "Hint" Was, Nobody Knows.

WASHINGTON, May 10.—President Taft's disinclination to interfere in the Mexican revolution, which has been a puzzle to many politicians, is explained here today by the statement, from high authority, that he has been informally invited by the powers to "keep hands off."

It is reported that the president has been informally advised by the representatives of England, France, Germany, Italy and Spain not to make any move which would necessitate American intervention.

PLAYHOUSE BURNS LION BLOCK EXIT

Is Responsible for Loss of Nine Lives—When Fire Breaks Out Lion Escapes from His Cage and Holds Actors in Dressing Rooms.

EDINBURGH, Scotland, May 10.—A performing lion, maddened by burns, was deemed responsible today for the loss of nine lives in a fire which last night destroyed the Empire music hall. The lion's master, "Great Lafayette," and his two assistants are among the dead.

65 LIVES TAKEN IN THREE MONTHS

Official Figures for First Three Months in Russia Show 65 Killed by Government—82 Russian Newspapers Are Fined for Articles.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 10.—According to official figures published today, 65 persons were sentenced to death in Russia during the first three months of 1911. In these months fines amounting to \$14,500 were imposed on 82 Russian newspapers for publishing articles objectionable to the authorities.

TWENTY BODIES AT TIA JUANA

Believe That Total Dead Will Reach 30—Rebel Leader Allows Federals to Come and Take Bodies of Dead Companions Away.

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REBELS TAKE JUAREZ AFTER HARD BATTLE

Three Hundred Reinforcements Arrive and Take Part in General Assault—Victory Comes After Brief but Hard Fight.

PRISONERS LIBERATED: JAIL BURNED DOWN

General Navarro and His Command Flee—Forty Dead Federals Found.

EL PASO, Tex., May 10.—General Navarro, commander of the Mexican federalists in Juarez, who had taken refuge in the barracks after Blanco's attack, surrendered this afternoon to General B. J. Viljoen, the Boer veteran.

EL PASO, May 10.—Mexican rebels captured Juarez at 10:30 o'clock this morning with 300 reinforcements who had just arrived from El Paso and took part in a general assault.

Reinforcements Arrive. The reinforcements which captured Juarez for the rebels arrived at 10 o'clock. Under the command of General Blanco, they at once stormed the old church, the federal stronghold.

Brief Resistance. The signal for the attack was given by the flying of the insurgent flag—a tri-color without the Mexican gray eagle—from the water tank on top of the city hall and from a flag staff nearby.

Navarro Flee. At 11 o'clock, half an hour after the capture of the cathedral and jail, there was still scattering firing throughout the town, but it was believed to come from isolated parties who did not yet know of the fall of the principal federal citadel.

Assault at Dawn. The final assault on Juarez began soon after dawn. At that hour the news that Blanco's reinforcements had captured Orozco's force to concentrate its fire on the jail, the cathedral, customs house and schools.

Take Church. General Orozco then returned to the cathedral and was pouring a withering fire against its defenders when Blanco's force swept up the street.

First Death Early. The first death in El Paso today by Mexican bullets came early. Simon Dominguez fell in the center of the town, his heart pierced by a stray shot.

Work of Bringing the Wounded in Juarez across the Rio Grande started today under a flag of truce. This was done by the ambulance men, but progress is being made.
