MOTHER'S DAY TO BE NEXT SUNDAY

Appropriate Services in Some of the Local Churches—"Father's Day" Also Boosted.

The official calls for Mothers' day next Sunday has been made by several local churches, where the sermons will be on "Mother" and the home.

With the exception of McKinley day, when it is the custom to wear white carnations—the favorite flower of the martyred president—no other day witnesses such a general usage of the flowers as that set apart all over the country for paying tribute to mother.

The Mothers' day movement was started about ten years ago, and has spread in popularity. The custom is for men to wear a white carnation in their coat lapels and for women to wear a bouquet.

If "mother" is dead, a black ribbon is worn with the blossom by the sons, and the daughters tie their bouquets with black.

In the last few years observance of the day has become a partial custom on the coast, and two years ago a movement was started in Spokane for a "Fathers' day."

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EX-GOVERNOR OF OREGON DEAD

Lafayette Grover Passes Away of Old Age—Was Governor in 1870 and Served Later in United States Senate—Retired in 1887.

PORTLAND, Or., May 10.—Lafayette Grover, former governor of Oregon, congressman and ex-United States senator, died at his home here today of natural causes brought on by old age. He was 88 years old.

He was elected governor of Oregon in 1870 and served until 1877, when he resigned to become United States senator, which position he occupied until 1885, when he retired from public life.

He was born in Bethel, Me., in 1823, and followed the law as a profession.
