

LOCAL BERRIES FIRST IN OREGON

Rogue River Valley Has Been Producing Strawberries for Past Three Weeks—First in Roseburg on April 29—Hood River May 20.

As is usual, Rogue River valley is again first in the field with strawberries. For the past three weeks patches throughout the valley have been producing the dainty small fruit, until now they are common in the market and the price, due to heavier offerings, has dropped from 29 to 15 cents a box.

Dispatches from other Oregon berry centers show that Douglas county is second in the list, having some grown on the market April 29, about ten days after the Rogue berry was offered. Josephine county offered berries Tuesday for the first time this year, while Hood River will have her berries on the market about May 20.

Douglas County. ROSEBURG, Or., May 11.—Cold weather held the first home grown berries on the market April 29. They are heavily offered now.

Hood River. HOOD RIVER, Or., May 11.—The world's attention to the excellent strawberries is being shipping. That was nearly 20 years ago. Shipments have gone as far as China and England, and have reached there in good condition. The first shipment consisted of but a few crates, and was sent by the Davidson Fruit company of this city, now shippers in carload lots.

For several years past shipments of strawberries from this city have totaled from 75,000 to 100,000 crates each year and as high as seven and eight cars have been shipped in a single day. Shipments from the valley this season, it is expected, will amount to at least 75,000 crates, which will be a little in excess of last year's shipment.

Strawberries in the United States that come into competition with these shipments are grown in Missouri, Arkansas and Colorado. Berries grown elsewhere are either marketed in the Hood River berries are ripe or after the Hood River berries are off the market. It is expected that shipments will go forward this year as early as May 20, and in view of the fact that the heavy frosts in the middle west have cut down the berry crop for this year, it is expected they will bring a very high price. The strawberry situation in the east points to a heavy crop, but this does not affect the berries grown in this section.

Josephine County. GRANTS PASS, May 11.—Grants Pass this morning received the first strawberries to be grown in Josephine county. The berries were fine ones and came from the A. E. Nickerson ranch, seven miles from the city on the Appleton road. Mrs. Nickerson states that they will gather 10 crates from an acre of plants and the product is better this spring than ever before. Other fruit on the ranch is coming ahead in fine shape and consists of raspberries, peaches, apples and pears.

TANGIER, May 11.—Advices from Mequinez, 36 miles southwest of Fez and one of the summer residences of the sultan, announce that Moulay el Zin, a brother of Sultan Moulay Hafid, has been proclaimed sultan by the rebel Zamouras, who, after capturing the place, pillaged the shops and killed several Jews.

Advices from Fez under recent date state that 2000 rebel tribesmen attacked the city from the north, but were repulsed after a heavy sra by the infantry and artillery. The government loss was slight.

Provisions have arrived in the city, which is holding out successfully. The European consuls in this city have decided to urge the Europeans at Fez to leave the capital for this place as soon as possible.

TO BOND COUNTY FOR GOOD ROADS

Siskiyou Committee Asks Aid of Governor to Obtain State Highway—Are Circulating Petitions—Want Man on Highway Commission.

YREKA, May 11.—The committee of 15 appointed at the Good Roads conference as a good roads committee has effected a permanent organization and elected Lehard S. Foulke chairman and C. J. Luttrell secretary.

The committee is circulating petitions which will be presented at the July meeting of the supervisors, asking for the appointment of a commission of three to select favorable routes, recommend changes in the old roads, lay out new ones, select building material, and make estimates of the probable cost.

The object is to induce the supervisors to eventually call an election to bond the county for building new roads. The following communication was sent to Governor Johnson:

To His Excellency, Hiram W. Johnson, Governor of California: We, as a committee of 15, three of whom come from each supervisorial district of Siskiyou county, appointed by the chairman of the good roads convention recently called by the board of supervisors of Siskiyou county, have this day taken the initial steps to bond our county for a sufficient amount to build good and permanent roads, and we hereby most respectfully petition your excellency to use your good influence to cause the state highway to be constructed from northern Siskiyou to southern San Diego.
