REBEL CAUSE RAPIDLY SPREADS

Insurrectos Are Advancing on Salina Cruz, Important Harbor on Western Coast - Have Surrounded Ensenada.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 11.—Further proof that the rebel cause is spreading like wildfire over Mexico was furnished today by Captain Knight of the steamer Nebraskan, which arrived here from Salina Cruz.

When the Nebraskan left Salina Cruz five days ago, a rebel party had surrounded Rincon, a small port close to Salina Cruz, and the federal authorities had small hope of having the town.

The rebels are already around Ensenada, capital of Lower California, according to advices received here today by the lobster steamer Yankee Boy and by Captain Jensen of the fishing steamer Vivian, The Ensenadans, in view of the recent loss of Tinajas, are now almost crazed with fear and excitement, and many of them are making every effort to get transportation to the United States.

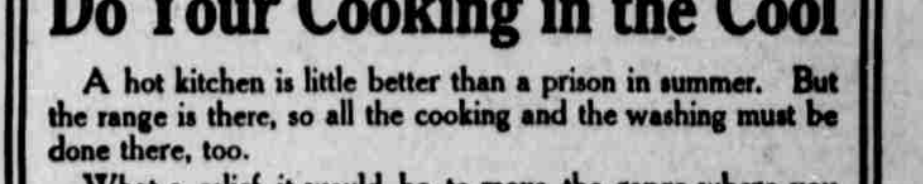
