## PLASTERERS NOW ARE ORGANIZED

**Craft Will Soon Be Operating in Medford Under Auspices of American Federation of Labor—Will Make No Demands on Employers.**

The plasterers of Medford and vicinity organized a local union last night at Smith's hall with a large charter list, with prospects of a complete organization of that craft immediately following the arrival of their charter. Frank Poole, state organizer, and C. O. Young, general organizer of the American Federation of Labor, were present and aided in bringing the plasterers under the fold of their international, said international being affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

There is no intimation or intention of the local plasterers' organization to at present make any demands upon employers as to change of hours or wages. They simply realize the necessity of organization that conditions may be maintained, and with a view of assisting to their utmost the local labor movement, which has had such a splendid growth in this vicinity in the recent past.

## PASSENGERS NEED NOT BE VACCINATED

SEATTLE, May 12.—Passengers embarking for Alaska will not be required to submit to being vaccinated hereafter if they can satisfy the surgeons that they have not been exposed to the disease during the previous two weeks, according to the latest modification of the vaccination order.

They must sign affidavits as follows: "I hereby swear that I intend to embark for a port in Alaska and to my best knowledge and belief, I have not been exposed to smallpox during the past 14 days and that I have truthfully answered the questions asked me as to my whereabouts during the past two weeks."
