James F. C.nock, superintendent of he western division of the board control of water rights, is in Medford on business pertaining to some of contested water claims.

About a year ago considerable trou-ble was had regarding water rights and of the 70 odd protests filed at that time only one, that of Mike Hanley versus J. W. Slinger, remains to be settled. The question in this case is that of priority and will be settled by the commissioners.
