

MINING RUSH MAY COME SOON

Eyes of Mining World Turned Upon Southern Oregon—Strokes of Late Have Been Made Frequently—Much Development Work.

To anyone observing the tendencies of the mining world it can be readily seen that there has been no great mining boom this year in any section of the world hardly a year has passed but what there has been a rush of gold-seekers to some part of the country or other in search of the precious metal but this year has witnessed no such rush and all engaged in mining are breathlessly waiting for news of a rich strike somewhere that they may be among the first on the ground. The eyes of the entire mining world are the present time turned upon the country surrounding the Rogue River valley and the large number of finds in the past few weeks bear out the idea that southern Oregon will be the scene of the next rush for riches.

From far Alaska comes word that operations in that country are practically at a standstill and from Nevada come tidings of a similar nature. The hills surrounding the valley are daily feeling the stroke of pick and shovel and the rush of mighty streams of water from the nozzles of huge hydraulic pumps is tearing farther and farther into the bowels of the earth in search of the precious mineral.

Not only is gold found in paying quantities, but silver, platinum, copper and lead are among the minerals discovered. Some of the greatest mining experts in the country are already in this vicinity and pronounce this one of the richest mining countries ever discovered. Three strikes of unusual importance have been recorded in the past 10 days and every day strikes of lesser magnitude are reported.

Four years ago a prospector named Higgins and his son were working a claim which paid them about \$10 a day today they have \$150,000 and are ready to be sent to the United States mine. Their claim is located about 16 miles west of Kerville and directly adjoining it is a tunnel 125 feet long, cut through a ledge six feet in thickness, the ore of which yields from \$15 to \$100 per ton. This ledge is owned by a Mr. Anderson and is at the head of Cherokee run. Another claim owned by Mr. Anderson is at the head of Day's gulch and ore to the value of \$10,000 has already been taken out. The mine is easily accessible, being only five miles from Kerville.

The Alameda mine on Galice creek is working to its full capacity and the new 700 ton smelter is being worked to its limit. Tin is an almost pure state is found in this neighborhood and is said to rival that produced by the famous tin mines of Cornwall, England. The Grayback district is said to abound in this metal and platinum has also been found in paying quantities in several of the districts in the neighboring mountains.

G. W. Thresher, one of the foremost mining men in the country, was in Medford Saturday and expressed his opinion that in a very short time Medford and Grants Pass would be in one of the greatest mining rushes ever known and that the mining done in the valley up to this time could be compared with the operations that are to come with the use of improved machinery and plenty of capital. He has been in the famous mining camps at the height of their boom and knows fully the conditions to be found there and can therefore predict with certainty the future for this immediate vicinity in case the predictions made for this section come true.

HOUSE COMMITTEE CONSIDERING WOOL

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 13.—The house ways and means committee today went into executive session to consider the wool schedule. The democratic members of the committee seem to be divided on the subject of revision. It is understood that seven democrats are demanding free wool and several others are insisting that some duty be levied. It is expected that the controversy will result in a 50 per cent reduction of the present tariff.

ELECTION IN TACOMA WILL SOON VOTE AGAIN

TACOMA, Wash., May 13.—No less than 50 non-partisan church meetings and a score of other meetings held directly in the throats of the different candidates will mark the end of campaigning in Tacoma's final commission-ership race election to be held tomorrow. The meetings will be general in their scope, to consider the civic questions involved, rather than to advocate the candidacy of any one, according to the committee in charge. The issues will be placed before the voters from the moral point of view.

WILL SEARCH FOR BODY OF BAKOWSKI

Posse Forming to Make Search in Crater Lake Region for Photographer Who Was Lost in Mid-Winter.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., May 15.—J. W. Stephenson, for ten years the bosom companion and partner of B. B. Bakowski, who perished either in the snow about Crater Lake or by falling down the precipice into the crater while on a picture-taking expedition in January, is here making arrangements with local parties to make another search just as soon as the snow will permit, for the body. Stephenson says Bakowski would have been 28 years of age on May 14. He had been in America about ten years, first coming from his native land in Russia to Chicago. There he met and became the friend of Stephenson, and for years they have traveled over the northwest as amateur photographers. For the past year Bakowski maintained a sort of headquarters at Bend, Or., and Stephenson was located at Baker, Or. The former was doing more of the outdoor work and sending the films to his partner to develop. They both planned to make a trip to Crater Lake during last winter to get photos of that wonderful district in its winter. About the time they were to have started for Klamath Falls to arrange to go in from here, matters came up which kept Stephenson from coming, and Bakowski came and went into these wilds alone when the snow was more than 20 feet deep. That he lost his life is now assured, as his camp was later found as he had apparently left it.

Death in Mystery.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 15.—Police cannot explain how an unknown man received cuts and bruises on the head which caused his death early today. He was found in an unconscious condition in a saloon, but no one seemed to know when or how he entered or how he was wounded. The fact that his pockets had not been rifled discredited any theory of robbery, but not that he might have had enemies who wanted to put him out of the way. Papers in his pocket indicated that his name might be P. Anderson, but nobody knows who P. Anderson is.
