

SANDRY MENAGED BY ROSEBURG MOB

Accused of Being a "Spotter" for the Prohibitionists Mob Quickly Forms and Threatens to string Him Up— Talks Them Out of It.

Following the indictment three days ago of every near-beer dealer in Roseburg on charges of selling intoxicating liquor in violation of the local option law, Deputy State Fish Warden Sam L. Sandry of Jackson county, narrowly escaped rough treatment in Roseburg last Saturday at the hands of a crowd of 50 men, who suspected him of being a "spotter" for the prohibitionists.

A drunken reveler, in loud tones, branded Sandry as a "spotter" and with others who took up the cry, followed Sandry to the city jail, where he delivered his prisoner for incarceration. Sandry was then surrounded by the mob and one person cried out "get a rope!" Sandry was cool in the ordeal, but facing his accusers without any sign of fear, said:

"Gentlemen, you are mistaken in your man. I am an officer of the law, but I am a spotter. I never did that kind of work and I never will. There isn't enough money in the world to induce me to do it. Ask your officers if I have ever been guilty of 'spotting'."

A friend of Sandry and a local citizen vouched for the truth of his statement and the mob slowly dispersed, though some appeared dissatisfied. It is reported that Sandry will prosecute two or three members of the mob who made threats against him. The sheriff's office issued a statement saying that Sandry was in no way connected with the gathering of the evidence leading to the indictment of the local near-beer dealers. Sandry is a resident of Roseburg, because of his appearance in this city frequently in company with a deputy game warden who was the prosecuting witness in several local option cases at the January term of the circuit court.

Harris, the man whom Sandry arrested, is accused by a 12-year-old girl, whom he attempted to entice to an isolated spot Saturday night. After accompanying her to a dark street, the little girl became suspicious of his intentions, jerked her arm from his grasp and ran home. Upon learning of this, Harris, on foot, started a search for Harris, enlisting the aid of Sandry because of his being a stranger here. Through the crowds of carnival revellers Sandry and the child walked for nearly an hour when the girl was suddenly accosted by Harris, and Sandry immediately took him into custody.

FEDERALS NARROWLY ESCAPE ANNIHILATION

NOCALES, Ariz., May 14.—A force of 200 federals under Colonel Diaz, nephew of the Mexican president, narrowly escaped annihilation at the hands of Juan Cabral's rebels yesterday, according to ranchers arriving here today. The federals, their progress cut off by destroyed bridges on the river Pacific in Sonora, were attacked by three times their number. Under the protection of two machine guns they repaired their attack and hurried south to Guaymas, leaving their dead behind. The fighting was spilt at long range for three hours. The casualties are unknown.

The dance held in the Garvin hall in Talent Saturday evening was well attended. Those present had a good time.


Reuben Rhodes of Medford was in Talent on Monday watching the growth of our little city.
