

MRS. POTTER OF ASHLAND DEAD

Was Mother of J. M. Potter, Who Brought Ashland Tribune to Medford and Started First Daily Paper Here.

ASHLAND, Or., May 17.—The funeral service of Mrs. Margaret J. Potter, a former resident of this city, was held at the residence of Mrs. A. H. Russell, 53 North Main street Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Interment was in Ashland cemetery.

The Rev. E. H. Hicks conducted the service. A selected choir rendered in a superb manner the hymns, "Lead Kindly Light" and "Some Day You Will Understand." The following members of the Episk's lodge, of which order two of Mrs. Potter's sons are members, acted as pallbearers: Dr. J. Endelman, W. B. Pracht, W. E. Newcombe, Otto Winter, Lyman McKee and William Mitchell. Mrs. Potter was the mother of T. J. Nulton, late editor of the Yreka Journal, and for several years secretary of the Shikyou county chamber of commerce, and of J. M. and J. W. Potter, the former cashier of the First National bank of Weed, Cal. She was the aunt of several nephews who attained fame in the business world, among them her oldest sister's son, Arthur Brisbane, who, as editor of the New York Journal, receives a salary as large as that of the president of the United States. Mrs. Potter was raised on a farm in Genesee county, New York, near the town of Batavia, and had lived until November 11, 1911, she would have been 74 years old. She was one of a family of eight children, six of whom have preceded her to the great beyond. None of them lived to be within ten years of the age of Mrs. Potter. Mrs. Potter had enjoyed perfect health

until within the last few years. For several months past she had been quite ill. That she might have the best of care, she was about a month ago brought by her sons to the new Granite City hospital, where everything possible was done for her, but age was against her and she had passed all human aid.

At 7:30 Saturday evening she became unconscious and three hours later her spirit winged its flight. Her son James was with her during the week and Mr. Nulton was to spend this week here. Friday and Saturday she was feeling better than at any time within a month and Mr. Potter left on train No. 13 for Weed, being assured that he could safely do so. Shortly after his return to his home the distressing news was received that all was over. She had found the serenity of death.

In many ways Mrs. Potter was a remarkable woman. She had a strong, well balanced intellect, was a brilliant conversationalist, and every ready in repartee. These qualities made for her a large circle of friends in this city, all of whom will be grieved to learn of her death.

GARDINER CASE WELL UNDER WAY

Third Day of Trial On—Will Probably Go to the Jury This Afternoon Administratrix Suing for \$7500 Damages From Railroad.

The damage suit brought by Mrs. Myrtle Gardiner, administratrix of the estate of Walter Gardiner, for \$7500 damages against the Pacific & Eastern railroad is being heard today in the circuit court. The third day of the trial opened today and the case will probably go to the jury this afternoon.

Walter Gardiner was an engineer on the road and was mixed up in a wreck. Later he went to Portland and was operated upon and died. Mrs. Gardiner as administratrix of the estate brought suit alleging that the wreck was responsible for the operation which resulted in death. The defense claims that the operation was made necessary by other causes than the wreck.
