

KAHN ATTACKS REFORM LAWS

Says Recall is Very Dangerous and That Initiative and Referendum is "Government Nostrum" — Says T. R. Would Have Been Recalled.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 19.—Declaring that neither Washington, Jefferson Madison, Lincoln, Lincoln nor Roosevelt could have continued in public life if they had been subject to the recall, Representative Julius Kahn (Republican, California) spoke in the house on the Arizona-New Mexico constitutional approval resolution. He dubbed the initiative, referendum and recall "governmental nostrums."

DOCTOR IS CALLED 7709 MILES AWAY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 19.—On a 7,709 mile steamer call, Dr. J. J. Choate is hastening Eastward today in an effort to beat death in a race to Rome, Italy. The sufferer is Miss Mildred Browning, aged 18, daughter of a wealthy Los Angeles family, stricken down while on a tour with her mother, Dr. Choate, who has long been the Brownink family physician, was summoned by cablegram and was told to spare no expense for speed. He hopes to leave New York on the Mauretania in five days, reaching London five days later. The entire trip is planned, will take thirteen days.

ONLY HOPE LIES IN LABOR UNIONS

LaFollette Says Only Safeguard American Workingmen Have Lies in Unionism—But These Organizations Must Not Countenance Crime.

MADISON, Wis., May 19.—"The destruction of the Los Angeles Times building," is the caption under which Senator LaFollette in the current issue of LaFollette's Weekly, says that the only hope for decent living wages for American workingmen lies in trade unions.

The editorial says: "The dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times—if it was dynamited—was a crime. For such a deed there is no defense. Right minded people will not tolerate violence under any name; but also right minded people must not pre-empt cases of this kind. If John McNamara and his confederates, acting either as officials of the Iron Workers' union or as individuals are proven of participation in this or similar crimes they must get the fullest penalty of the law. In unionism lies the only present hope of the American workingman for decent living wages and tolerable conditions of labor. But labor cannot countenance crime even if it is committed in the name of industrial justice. If there be anarchists within labor organizations they must be weeded out."
