

SUPREME COURT FLAYED IN HOUSE

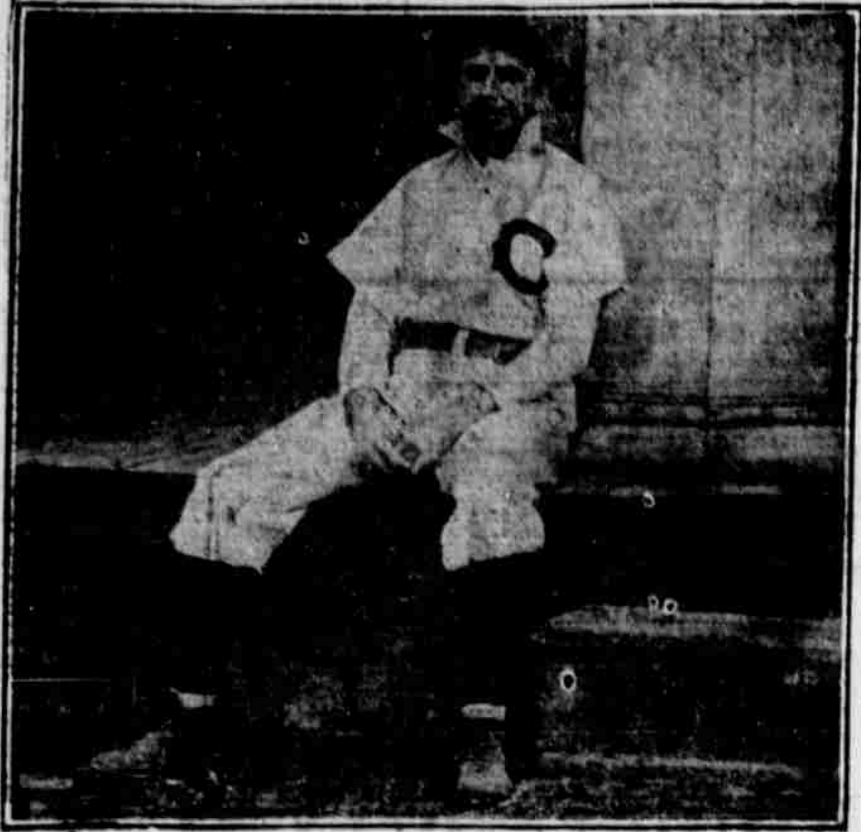
Caustically Criticizes High Tribunal
for Their Usurpation of Legislative
Authority in Connection With the
Standard Oil Decision.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 20.—Caustic criticism of the United States supreme court for constitutional usurpation of legislative authority was voiced in the house by Representative Allen of Ohio.

Allen declared the Arizona constitutional provision for the recall of judges was an outgrowth of the general distrust of the courts and the feeling that it is necessary to provide a method of hecking judges from assuming legislative and executive powers.

"This week," he said, "we have witnessed a public protest against the decision of the highest court in the land. The statute they considered makes no strict reference to reasonable or unreasonable restraints upon trade. Numerous attempts to amend that statute by including the word 'unreasonable' have repeatedly failed. I rejoice that we have one member of that court who opposed his fellows with the assertion that the judiciary should not attempt to legislate but only to pass decision upon what the legislative arm of the government had enacted."

WILSON NOW IS MAD ABOUT IT

Declares He Has Nothing Further to
Say on Recall of Judges—Comments
on Standard Oil Decision by
Supreme Court.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 20.—Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey is definitely against the recall of judges.

He's getting mad about it now, and doesn't want to discuss it again. He talked freely and pleasantly here today about commission form of government, the initiative, the referendum, direct primary, home rule for Alaska, longer bed sheets at hotels, but when the matter of the recall of judges came up, the current was switched off.

"I have discussed that matter so often that I don't believe I have another word to say about it," he said. "Nor would he."

Governor Wilson, however, got off one significant utterance about the supreme court in the Standard Oil case. "I have heard comment," he said, "that the action of the court in inserting that word 'unreasonable' was unfortunate."

Racing Season Opens.
TORONTO, Ont., May 20.—The Canadian racing season opened here today with a program of seven events at the Ontario Jockey Club's Woodbine track. The big feature of today's card was the King's Plate, confined strictly to Dominion-bred horses. Despite earlier announcements that there would be no betting on the first race, the pari-mutuel system of speculation was in operation in all seven races.

CHARLIE SAYS WILL WILL WIN

Brother of President Believes Taft
Will Again Be Elected to Chief Office
of the Land—Sails for Europe
for a Visit.

NEW YORK, May 20.—That William H. Taft will be re-elected and re-elected president of the United States was the prediction made today by Charles F. Taft, the president's brother. Charles Taft sailed today on board the Steamer Lapland for a motoring trip through England and France. His prediction was made just before sailing.

"You may think I am prejudiced," he said, "but everything in the west is indicative of the fact that my brother is the favorite among business men. The administration's success in bringing the Standard Oil case to a successful termination will be a strong republican card in the next campaign."

DUTY ON WOOL CUT IN HALF

Will Keep House in Session All Summer Unless Senate Agrees to Vote Favorably on New Wool Schedule.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 20.—The ways and means committee of the house decided today to cut wool duties one-half. The committee immediately began drafting a bill which will be placed before the democratic caucus. Simultaneously with the announcement that the ways and means committee had decided to cut the wool duties in half, the democrats in the house sent an ultimatum to members of the senate to the effect that unless the higher body votes favorably on the wool schedule bills, the democrats would not agree to a recess, but would keep congress in session all summer.

ACCUSED OF TAKING BRIBE STILL WORKS

OAKLAND, Cal., May 20.—Refusing absolutely to discuss his case, Henry P. Dalton, assessor of Alameda county, accused of having accepted \$5000 as a bribe to reduce the tax assessment of the Spring Valley Water company, today is at his office attending to the usual routine of business. Following his indictment on two counts by the grand jury, Dalton's bail was increased from \$15,000 to \$45,000. Friends of the accused man accented around and in a few hours had returned with the necessary bondsmen to qualify on the \$45,000 guarantee for his appearance. Dalton's arraignment will take place Monday morning.

BITTER ATTACK ON MORMONISM

Janet Richards for Daughters of American Revolution Appears Before Naval Committee—Would Bar Brigham Young's Picture.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 20.—Denouncing Mormonism, Janet Richards, representing the Daughters of the American Revolution, before the house committee on naval affairs today protested against the placing of pictures of Brigham Young on the silver service for the battleship Utah. "I regard Brigham Young as an undesirable type of American," said Miss Richards. "If Catholics presented a silver service to a battleship and on the service were pictures of the pope with the Vatican in the background, the design would not be accepted. Yet the pope is guilty neither of murder, treason nor polygamy." Rev. Robert Stephenson of Westminster college, Salt Lake, also said, had declared that when Arizona and New Mexico were admitted to the union, 16 federal senators would be under the control of the Mormon church.

WILSON GREET'S HAY WITHOUT WORD WASTE

SEATTLE, Wash., May 20.—Ahead of his schedule, Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey reached the union depot at 8:15 this morning where Governor Hay and select group of early risers were waiting. There was no formality. Just "I am Governor Hay." "How do you do?" "This way please." "Fine salt air this morning," and the rest was lost in the noise of the automobile engines chugging. There was no parade. The machines carried the New Jersey governor to the Washington Hotel where he shaved and got his breakfast. At 10 o'clock he was ready to meet the cross fire of newspaper questions.



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
