

CHURCH CONDEMN SUNDAY SPORTS

General Assembly of Presbyterian Church Puts Ban on Baseball, Automobileing, Traveling and Other Things on the Sabbath Day.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 20.—The general assembly of the Presbyterian church, meeting here, adopted today the report of the Sabbath Observance Committee, containing Sunday baseball, Sunday sports, automobileing, traveling, theaters and aviation meets. The report was adopted by a vote of 100 to 10.

Fire in Hotel. NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., May 20.—A fire was discovered in a room of the Windsor Hotel last night. Two brothers from Seattle, Carl and John Morris, who stopped at the hotel for a couple of days, were in the room at the time the fire started, presumably from lighted tobacco.

Yukon Ice Breaks. WHITE HORSE, Yukon Territory, May 20.—The steamer Canadian of the White Pass and Yukon Route today is en route to Dawson with 100 passengers today, the ice on the Yukon river having broken north of Hootalinqua. Officials of the route announced that they expected to haul \$12,000,000 worth of gold dust during the coming season.

Children Burn to Death. STOCKTON, Cal., May 20.—Two Japanese children, one aged 2 years and the other six months, were burned to death today near Orwood. The children were in a cabin. The door jammed and their mother could not force her way in to rescue them.

Fight in Sacramento. SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 20.—Fight fans are today digesting their first feed of fights since Governor Gillett stopped the sport last summer. Terry Murphy of New York, won a ten-round decision over Charley Alvinger, of Sacramento. Frankie Harris made Eddie Dunn quit in the second round. Three other six-round draws were fought.

MADERO DEADLY FOE OF GAMBLING

Provisional President Will Abolish Gambling in Its Various Forms as Bull Fighting if He is Elevated to Presidency.

JUAREZ, Mexico, May 20.—The possible accession of Francisco I. Madero to the presidency of Mexico, will be a serious blow to the time honored custom of bull fighting and gambling of all sorts, according to a statement by the rebel leader. "I am opposed to gambling in any form," said Madero today. In Mexico gambling must cease. All gambling concessions made after November 20, 1910 the date our revolution was officially declared, will be cancelled as soon as the revolutionary forces assume a share in the government. Concessions made before that will be permitted to run their course but will not be renewed. The Mexican National Lottery also will be discontinued. Madero and his followers already are investigating gambling in Juarez.

RIGHT HOUR LAW FOR WOMEN IN EFFECT SOON. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 20.—The California eight hour law for women will go into effect Monday and the state officials have notified employers that it will be rigidly enforced. The law provides that women employes may not work more than eight hours per week, nor more than 48 hours per week. It is predicted that the big hotels will bring the law before the courts in a test case as soon as possible.

Scientists Sail. SEATTLE, Wash., May 20.—Headed by A. C. Bent of Taunton, Mass., the Smithsonian Institute party, en route to Attu, the most westerly of the Aleutian islands are aboard the revenue cutter Thetis, which sailed from Tacoma. The party will gather specimens of birds, flowers, mammals and rocks for the institute. It is expected that some rare flora and birds will be secured. Other naturalists in the expedition are: H. C. Beck, of San Jose, Cal.; F. R. McKechnie of Boston and Alexander Wetmore of Lawrence, Kan.

Reyes Hailed by Diaz. MONTERREY, Mex., May 20.—Hailed in his return to Mexico by the orders of President Diaz, General Bernardo Reyes, according to messages received here today, is stopping at Havana. It is believed here that the activity of Reyes' supporters, who will seek to have him elected president, caused Diaz' action. It is said that many Maderists are ready to support Reyes and it is feared by Diaz that his arrival would be the signal for a new uprising.

Engineer Drowned. PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., May 20.—William H. Tully of Los Angeles, port engineer for Foley Welch and Stewart, the railway contractors, was drowned today in the Skeena river with William Grant, a fireman, his companion in a small rowboat. The men were rowing up the river when the boat capsized. Tully was aged 49 and unmarried. His mother lives in Los Angeles. Little is known here about Grant.

Herrmann in Los Angeles. LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 20.—Garry Herrmann, president of the National Baseball commission and grand exalted ruler of the Elks, arrived in Los Angeles today. He is here on fraternal business, but will also keep his eyes open for promising baseball material. Herrmann has made a special request to see Pitcher Delhi of the Los Angeles club in action. The Cincinnati management, of which Herrmann is the chief, has been making inquiries about Delhi for months.

ILLINOIS SOLONS HAVE ADJOURNED

Nearly all Reform Bills Are Killed—Newspapers Forbidden to Publish News of Crime Waves or Details of Murder Trials.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 20.—After one of the longest sessions on record and in which most of the so-called progressive policies failed of enactment, the 47th session of the state legislature adjourned at 7 a. m. today. The closing hours were enlivened by a clash in both the house and senate over a ten hour day for women, the house after spirited debate, finally receding from its amendments and accepting the bill as it was passed by the senate.

The initiative and referendum, anti-pass, woman suffrage, county option and the Oregon system of electing senators were among the important measures that were defeated. Among the measures passed were the employers liability law, the bill broadening the civil service scope and that reducing the recall percentage in the commission form of government law from 75 to 65 per cent. Governor Denen was expected to veto today the bill passed just before adjournment, forbidding the publication of crime news. The measure forbids newspapers to print details of murder trial or other news of immoral and indecent character. Violation of the proposed law is punishable by a fine of \$1,000 and six months imprisonment. Publishers claim that strict enforcement of the measure would make impossible the publication of a story of the assassination of the president, should it occur.

White Attacks Japs. SEATTLE, Wash., May 20.—Two Japanese, employed on a Standard Oil barge, were passing under the Hogue street viaduct when a white man accosted them and demanded to know where they were going. Upon getting their explanation white man lunged forward, struck I. Inouye, knocking him down, the other Jap, S. Fukin escaped. Inouye's body was found and the report made to the police. The white man is missing.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon four deaths had been reported and police ambulances were busy conveying heat victims to the hospitals.

FOREST FIRE DOES VAST AMOUNT DAMAGE

Wheatley, an officer of the company, today requested local officials to swear in extra deputies for the protection of the cargo. Deputy United States Marshal W. H. DIETZ'S ATTORNEYS ASK NEW TRIAL

FOND DU LAC, Wis., May 20.—Attorneys for John P. Dietz, "Defender of Cameron dam," now under sentence of life imprisonment for the murder of Deputy Sheriff Oscar Harp, filed today a formal motion asking for a retrial of the case. If the motion is overruled, the case will be carried on appeal, to the supreme court. The condition of Clarence Dietz, a son of the prisoner, who was operated on for appendicitis on Thursday, was declared today to be critical.

Thompson to Coast. CHICAGO, May 20.—Following an offer from Charles Cleaver to box Frank Klaus in San Francisco, June 16, "Cyclone" Thompson announced today that he would leave for the coast at once. Cleaver says he will give Thompson 25 per cent of the gross receipts.
