

MEDFORD WINS A GAME AT LAST

Defeats Mt. Angel College Boys by a 917 Score—Will Play Second Game Today Which Should Be Good One.

The baseball game between Medford and Mt. Angel colleges was well attended, and some good as well as bad play was seen. The game at a glance:

1st Inning, Medford. Hader got to let on error of the college shortstop, scored on Crews' 3-bagger. Thying got to let on a fielder's choice when Crews scored. Isaacs walked on a passed ball and Wilson's hit to left field scored Thying and Isaacs. 4 runs.

2nd Inning, Mt. Angel. Jaspers singled to left field and took second while Antle was investigating the whereabouts of the ball, and scored on Yarrow's two-bagger to the left field. "Pug" error in center allowed Coleman to reach first base, scoring Yarrow. Melchior mashed one into the third bag which bounced out of Lewis' reach. Rudy Schmitz wound up the hitting in this inning with a line drive to left field. Total score, Medford scoring 3 runs.

3rd Inning, Medford. Medford got an earned run through Isaacs' long two-bagger to center field and Antle's single in the same direction. 4th, Mt. Angel.

Browning got to let base when Hill hit the third strike. Jaspers and Yarrow both singled to left field and all three scored on the throw in from right field after Crews had been caught out on a long fly, being assisted by a couple of wild heaves back and forth across the diamond. 2 runs.

4th Inning, Medford. Hill walked, stole second and scored on "Shorty's" two-bagger to center field. 1 run.

5th Inning, Medford. Hader knocked a two-bagger to the left field fence and scored on Crews' long single to center field. 1 run.

6th Inning, Medford. With two out Crews knocked a pop up by which neither the pitcher nor 1st baseman seemed inclined to catch. He stole second. Thying got first base on Schmitz' error and both men were advanced as the ball went into the bleachers, and scored when Browning dropped Isaacs' long fly to center field. 2 runs.

9th Inning, Mt. Angel. Melchior walked and got around to third on Van Hoomston's single, and stole home while Medford was trying to catch Van Hoomston between first and second. 1 run.

ROOT IS BUSY BUILDING WALK

Temporary Injunction is Dissolved by Judge Neil After Hearing Arguments and Taking Matter Under Advisement.

The temporary injunction issued restraining John M. Root from constructing a twelve-foot sidewalk on the Main street side of the Sparta block by County Judge J. H. Neil at the instance of H. Pierce, a resident of the east side, who claimed that the sidewalk made the street at the approach to the Bear Creek bridge too narrow, was dissolved by the judge Saturday afternoon after he had the case under advisement for a period of twenty-four hours. City Attorney Neff took the matter up on behalf of the city and Mr. Root while H. E. Kelly appeared for Mr. Pierce. Mr. Root immediately upon learning that the injunction had been dissolved had the concrete work started again and the sidewalk is now being installed.

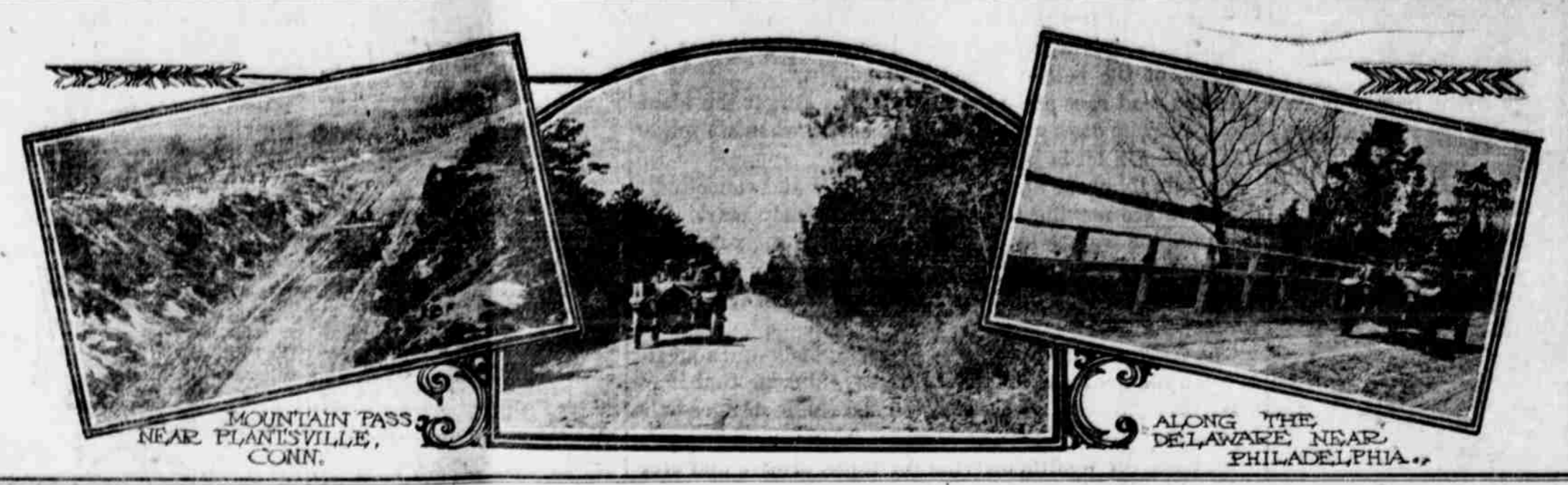

The machine was captured by a squall. It burst into flames the instant it struck the ground. The body of the lieutenant was burned beyond recognition. Bournaque's arms were broken and his legs fractured. He died later.
End Opium Traffic in 1917 PEKING, China, May 20.—It is announced that the Sino-British agreement has been signed. Among other stipulations is a provision that China's production of the drug and India's export of it shall be proportionately reduced year by year until the traffic ceases entirely, which will be no later than 1917.
