CRATER LAKE SNOW 11 FEET DEEP YET

Superintendent Arant Has Done Nothing Toward Finding Body of Bowski to Great Depth of Snow at Lake.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., May 20.—Indications are that the Crater lake season will be exceptionally late this year. The snow in the park was deeper this winter than for several years and the spring has been colder than usual. At the station of the superintendent the snow is still approximately 11 feet deep. Superintendent J. W. Arant and Chief Ranger H. E. Momyer have been delayed in making further search for the body of Babowski, the young photographer who was lost in the park last winter. The Klamath country has been having stormy weather during the past week and whenever there is rain in the basin there is snow in the mountains surrounding the lake. When the weather finally settles the lake will be open and will make a thorough search. Superintendent Arant said. "It is possible the body may be found on the rim of the lake, but I believe I lost his footing and went down the steep bank. If this is the case it is very possible the body is never to be recovered as it doubtless lodged in some crevice, or caught in some of the jagged rocks projecting from the almost perpendicular wall. Even if the man was lost in the vicinity of his camp, it is doubtful if the body will be found until after the snow goes off."

To Tax Unmarried Women. BOSTON, Mass., May 20.—Mrs. Charlotte Smith of Boston, wanted to tax bachelors, but the legislature did not see that way. Now Dr. Bertha C. Downing of Worcester calls for a tax on unmarried women and unmarried women strikes the Boston bachelors as a splendid answer to Mrs. Smith's proposal to tax them. Mrs. Smith's argument was that the men are selfish and will not assume matrimonial cares. Dr. Downing believes that women should wed, also that they should have children, especially women whose husbands are well able to support a family. "The increase in luxury," she said today, "prevents many from marrying at all." Dr. Downing also blames the tendency to intellectualism among the women for the lack of marriage. Her tax, she says, would make a girl hesitate before she decided to reject an eligible suitor for the sake of her books and single blessedness.

Poor Pastor Gets Fortune. BOSTON, Mass., May 20.—With a parish of 150 people, a salary of \$1,000 a year and an excellent church, the Rev. William M. Crane, a minister in the village of Richmond, in the Berkshire shires, who recently inherited a fortune, will build on a hill overlooking his church a new residence which will cost \$150,000 and which will compare with some of the finest houses in smart Lenox. Although he is possessed of wealth enough to enable him to retire, Mr. Crane is content to build his palace in the midst of the farms of his humble parishioners. The Congregational church of Richmond is an old one and small. Hitherto the Richmond ministers have been content to reside in a farmhouse that is modestly itself.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 20.—Five young negroes, John Henry Prather, James Holmes, Charles Posey, Elijah Turner, and Bud Johnson, are sentenced to hang from the gallows here today. They were convicted of the murder of W. H. Archie, a white plumber, in March. Archie was on his way home about 1:20 a. m. as he was passing the statehouse he was attacked by the five negroes, who down when he resisted, and then robbed.

ICE PLANTS ARE READY FOR RUSH

Cold Storage Rooms Are Filled With Stock—Biggest Season in History of City Is Now in Sight in Point of Consumption.

With the coming of the fruit season and hot weather the ice manufacturing plants in Medford are preparing for the rush and artificial ice is being made and stored for future use. The Medford Ice Company, whose plant fronts the Southern Pacific tracks on the south side, has 1100 tons on hand with the refrigerating machine working to its full capacity. All refrigerators are passing through Medford are packed here and about 750 cars of fruit grown around Medford was attended to last year. Any amount of fruit can be taken care of this year. The plant has not been used since the winter of 1909. While nothing definite has been decided upon, it is planned to enlarge the plant, probably this fall. At present about eight tons of ice can be frozen daily besides cooling the storage rooms and the output will be greatly increased. The Winheart Cold Storage company is also planning to build an entirely new plant. The plans have not been completed as yet, however, and nothing definite is known except that a plant of the most modern type will be erected on the site of the present building.

Red Hot Nail Free Convict. ATHENS, Ga., May 20.—Jack Robinson, a 19-year convict, white man, serving time in the county chain gang of Clarke, effected his escape by means of a red hot nail, stole a horse from a barn near the camp, saddled him, drove him through the city, passed several policemen, and made good his getaway. Robinson had been claiming to be ill for some days, and had been in the hospital shack at the camp. While the weather was damp he was allowed to have a fire to dry out the air. In the fire he placed a large nail he had found in some manner. When the nail was hot he applied it by means of the tongue to the plank wall. The plank was repeated and repeated all afternoon until a plank had been eaten away sufficiently to weaken it so that he could break it through and crawl out.
