LONDON, May 23.—Millions of loyal subjects lined the streets of London and cheered King George and Queen Mary as they rode in an open carriage in the procession and opened the Festival of Empire at the Crystal Palace. Thousands of school children massed at different points of the line of march sang the national anthem. An imperial choir of five thousand voices gave an all-British concert with inspiring effect. When they started to return to Buckingham Palace the King and Queen were pelted with flowers and were cheered all along the route. They appeared to be delighted with the success of this, the beginning of the Coronation festivities.
