

PEACE TREATY TO BE RATIFIED

United States to Put Stamp of Approval Upon Anglo-American Agreement Declares Butler—Carnegie Plans Also Announced.

LAKE MOHONK, N. Y., May 24.—That the United States senate in all probability will ratify the Anglo-American arbitration treaty was declared here today by President Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia University when, as presiding officer, he opened the sessions of the Lake Mohonk conference for the promotion of international arbitration.

The conference today re-elected Nicholas Murray Butler president and chose H. C. Phillips as secretary and Alexander Wood of Camden, N. J., treasurer for the coming year.

HEARST WANTS TO BE SENATOR

Editor Sails for Europe Predicting Democratic Success Next Year at Polls—Takes First Trick in Fight for Control—Would Succeed Root

NEW YORK, May 24.—Predicting that next year's election will be a success for the democrats and freely praising Governor Wilson of New Jersey, Judson Harmon of Ohio and Speaker Champ Clark, William R. Hearst, sailed today for Europe.

Hearst declared that the democrats had "made good" in their organization of the house and that their reward would be the election of a president from the party. Asked if he himself, will be a presidential candidate he answered with a broad smile: "I can't say as to that."

That Hearst has taken the first trick in connection with his fight for the control of the Tammany organization and the up-state democratic machine is now conceded here by many politicians. His win scored, he will now recuperate abroad.

DARROW NOT POSTED IN CASE

Chief Counsel of Alleged Dynamiters Denies All Knowledge of Situation—Will Hereafter Confine His Talking to the Jury and Cut Out Press.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 24.—Clarence Darrow of Chicago who is to be chief counsel for the McNamara Brothers in Los Angeles, arrived here last night. He will leave for the south tonight. Darrow held a conference with a number of labor leaders here. He said today that he had no knowledge of the evidence in the Los Angeles dynamiting cases except from the newspapers. He said he had been employed by the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers to defend the McNamaras.

"I do not know either of the men personally unless I might have met John McNamara at some convention. I understand that neither J. B. McNamara nor Ortie McManigal is a member of the Iron Workers' Union. Since taking up the case, I, of course, have had no opportunity to talk with the defendants. I have no definite plan of action mapped out.

"I have no knowledge of the arrests of the two men in connection with the attempt to dynamite the Hall of Records. I cannot discuss what connection or influence that may have upon the McNamara cases. "Hereafter I will do my talking to the jury."

THOUSAND LIVES LOST NEEDLESSLY EACH YEAR

NEW YORK, May 24.—More than 1000 lives a year are needlessly sacrificed in the United States by fire, is the statement of President W. H. Merrill before the National Fire Protection association today which has stirred that body to renewed efforts. "More than 20,000 lives and \$2,000,000,000 in property," said Merrill, "have been lost by fire in America within the last 20 years. Four-fifths of the loss was needless and might easily have been averted."

BLANKS FOR NEW POSTAL BANK HERE

Assistant Postmaster Woodford Ordered to Oroville, Cal., for Purpose of Receiving Instructions as to Conducting New Department.

The local postoffice is in receipt of the necessary blanks, instructions and books in connection with the opening of a postal savings bank in this city and will open for business as previously announced on January 12.

Assistant Postmaster Ralph Woodford has been ordered to Oroville, California, where a postal bank is in operation and will there receive instructions as to the conducting of the new department. Mr. Woodford will leave Sunday to take up the work.

The postal saving bank will be opened June 12 and there after any persons over 10 years of age will be allowed to make deposits up to an amount of \$500 on which interest will be paid at the rate of two per cent per annum.

TURKEY SERVED AN ULTIMATUM

Russia Insists Upon Disavowal of Warlike Intentions Upon Montenegro—Twenty Thousand Albanians in Armed Rebellion Against Porte.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 24.—Russia served on Turkey today a demand so drastic as almost to amount to an ultimatum, insisting on the immediate disavowal of any warlike intention by the porte upon Montenegro. The Turkish cabinet is considering an answer. It is not believed it will hold out against Russia's demand.

More than 20,000 Albanians are now in armed rebellion against Turkey. Rifles and ammunition are scarce among them but they are capturing more from the Turkish troops every day. Guerilla fighting is going on constantly and the rebels generally have the best of it. Many Montenegrins, some Bulgarians and Greeks and a few Italians are fighting in the rebel ranks. Several thousand men have been killed or wounded on each side since the rebellion started, and it is said, Prince Nicholas of Montenegro is giving more than moral assistance to the foes of the Turks.

This attitude of Montenegro is the basis of the Turkish threat against that country which has called forth the Russian ultimatum.
