MEDFORD MADE KEY STATION

Will Be Placed on United States Weather Map—Mrs. O'Gara Will Take Charge of Local Weather Hereafter.

Medford has literally been "placed upon the map" by being made the key station for the United States Weather bureau in Southern Oregon and as such will hereafter appear on all of the weather maps published by the bureau in Southern Oregon and as to be shipped here and placed at once and all forecasting for southern Oregon will be done from Medford. These forecasts will be made twice daily. The weather will no doubt be considerably better in the future as Mrs. P. J. O'Gara has been appointed local forecaster in place of her husband. Some say that the professor lost his job on account of the beastly weather he has been giving us which only cleared away when he left for a northern trip leaving Mrs. O'Gara in charge. However that may be Mrs. O'Gara is now the duly authorized weather forecaster and expert in charge of this district.

GEORGE P. LINDLEY CROSSES DIVIDE

Former Treasurer of Jackson County and Well Known Citizen Passes Away at Age of 63—Was Bank Director and Prominent in Business

George P. Lindley, at one time county treasurer of this county, vice president of the First Trust & Savings bank of Klamath Falls and a director in the Jackson County bank of this city, died at his home, 103 North Roosevelt avenue, at an early hour Friday morning. He had been a resident of Medford for 18 years. Notice of the funeral will be given later.

Mr. Lindley had been sick since last November. Previous to that time he was actively engaged in business and always took a great interest in the affairs of the city and was widely known. La Grippe set in during the winter which finally proved fatal in spite of the best endeavors of his physicians.

Mr. Lindley was born at Long Island, New York, November 26, 1849 and was 63 years old at the time of his death. He left New York while a young man moving to Iowa, later to Washington and then to Oregon, locating in Medford 18 years ago. He leaves a wife and one son, George R. Lindley, vice president of the Jackson County bank in which his father was a director.

Mr. Lindley was elected treasurer of Jackson county in 1896 and served one term, declining to seek re-election.

NO PEAR BLIGHT HERE THIS YEAR

Active Campaign Last Summer Successfully Checked Ravages of Disease in Local Orchards—Other Districts Infected.

Although the season has been open for the past two months no pear blight has as yet made its appearance this season in the Rogue River valley. Inspectors have visited nearly all of the orchards, in the valley put no signs of a hold over case of blight has been found. Last season pear blight made some headway in the valley but the prompt measures taken by the county authorities in lending assistance to Professor P. J. O'Gara by giving him a large number of inspectors allowed the pathologist to stamp it out. This year a number of holdover cases were expected but a careful inspection of the valley just completed shows that blight has been completely eradicated.
