

PUPILS WORK MOST INTERESTING

Exhibit of Work Done During Year by Industrial and Fine Arts Departments of Public School—Largest of Any Yet Given.

A most interesting exhibit was given Wednesday and Thursday at the high school of the work done during the year by the pupils in the industrial and fine arts department. This is the largest exhibit of its kind ever given here.

Sewing Exhibit.

On the first floor, in the sewing room, was the work of the girls in the sixth and seventh grades. Here were seen the pieces on which the girls had learned their stitches, and as they advance they apply these same stitches on small garments.

Going up to the second floor was found the work of the more advanced students. The eighth grade girls had made an undergarment by hand, and some had embroidered an initial in the front of the garment. Next followed the work of the first year high school, which was the continuation of the eighth grade, and the second year high school finishing these garments.

Domestic Science Display.

In the basement of the building was found the exhibit of the domestic science department. Here were many good things to eat, artistically arranged on the tables and small stoves. Among these things may be mentioned the cakes, salads, meat loaves, cheese straws, roasted chicken, fruit salads, gingerbread, cup cakes, hermits, doughnuts, biscuit, cinnamon rolls and croquettes.

Exhibit of the Boys.

In the hall on the first floor was found the exhibit of the boys. Rocking chairs, dining room chairs, Morris chairs, stools, hat trees, bookcases, hall seats, writing desks, center and library tables, book racks, waste paper baskets, clothes racks and pedestals, which would have done credit to any man. The boys are required to make working drawings of all of their projects before they are allowed to start the construction.

Many Visitors Welcomed.

There was a large number of visitors at the exhibit, and many who came on Thursday afternoon were very much disappointed because the work in the cooking had been up for only one day, but insisted upon seeing the place where the girls learned to make such good things to eat.

ASHLAND PLANS ROSE CARNIVAL

June 6 is Date Set for Floral and Strawberry Show—Cooperation at Medford Ladies is Sought—New Features to be Added This Year.

A committee of Ashland ladies, members of the Civic Improvement club, have been in Medford this week seeking co-operation of the ladies of the Greater Medford club in making the Ashland rose carnival a success.

Several new features will be added to the carnival this year. Among them will be the carnival ball to be given at the Natatorium on the evening of carnival day.

Another feature just announced will be a play to be given at the Iris theater the evening before. Manager Lyons has generously offered to divide the profits with the Civic Improvement club, and an excellent stock company will give a musical comedy. Preceding this play a number of local boys and girls, prettily costumed, will give a fancy drill. The admission will be 35 cents.

BOARD CHOOSES GAME WARDENS

PORTLAND, May 26.—The state fish and game commission is in session at the Imperial hotel today considering applications for the position of game warden. Over 150 applications are on file.

The board reached the conclusion to establish a new office of superintendent of state hatcheries at a salary of \$2000 annually and elected J. N. Wisner of Oregon City to the place. This superintendent will work under the game warden and the fish warden as well. He will have charge of trout and salmon hatcheries, the trout hatcheries being maintained largely from the game fund and the salmon hatcheries from the hatchery fund of the state.

Notification was sent out by the board to all of the mills of the state and others who own dams, fish ladders, irrigation works or other obstructions to streams that an investigation will be made in the near future of all such devices or ditches and the board will determine to what extent the law in this respect is being observed.

Mr. Wisner has had wide experience in his new position, announced yesterday, having been in the government service for many years. His activities have been confined to the western part of the United States and to Alaska. He worked with the Alaska salmon commission in 1904 with marked success. He was highly recommended to the state by his former employers.

The work shown by the lower grades was most interesting and very well done. The weaving of the doll slippers, hoods and Tam O'Shanter by the little fingers shows much patient work. The woven mats were particularly well done. In fact, all the work shows the interest that has been taken by the children. The raffia work was well done. Some very pretty and well shaped baskets and hats were exhibited, also some very neatly tied hammocks.

The crayon drawing and water colors of all the grades made a very good showing and some very clever work has been done. The display of mechanical drawing was good and shows the result of careful study. This course is entirely independent of the manual training department.

There was quite an exhibit of stencil work, both on paper and textiles, which were very attractive and creditable. The pupils of the sixth, seventh and eighth grades were each required to draw, cut and shellac a stencil.

The designs used on the book covers were all original. Many yards of stenciling has been done for table runners and sofa pillows and a good display was made. This department is under the direction of Miss Jennie Sneider, and the good work done is the result of careful study and a close oversight of the work done by the pupils.

PUPILS MADE ALL ARTICLES

Miss McDermott Denies Published Statement Regarding Withdrawal of Domestic Science Display at Annual Exhibit of School Products

Regarding a published statement that the exhibit of the Domestic Sciences department was withdrawn upon orders of the authorities, Miss Edna M. McDermott, director of Domestic Science and Arts, makes the following statement:

"The exhibit in the Domestic Science department was only on one day and evening as was advertised before the exhibit and printed in the invitations which Mr. Collins sent out, it was not ordered down by 'The High School authorities' as was stated.

"As to the fact that the articles were made by the girls in their homes, it is true and each girl gave her word of honor that she had done all the work herself on each article. To any cook it would appear very absurd to think that a large food exhibit could be prepared in a small school kitchen and have it fresh for exhibition purposes. Also the results obtained under home conditions show more accurately what each girl can do.

"The reason for the cooking exhibit not being left up longer is that a great many of the articles were very perishable and a food exhibit is difficult to keep in good appearance more than one day.

"The article mentioned shows very distinctly one of two things either that the person that wrote it was very ignorant of their subject matter and had been misinformed or that there is an over supply of existing jealousy on the behalf of some whose exhibit was not as much admired as was the cooking display."

ASHLAND'S DRY LAW IS VALID

Judge Calkins Holds That Charter Nullifies Local Option Law in Granite City, as Medford's Charter Does in This City.

Circuit Judge Calkins has decided that the Ashland prohibition ordinance was valid in the case of the transient bootlegger Black, serving a 50-day term in city jail after being convicted in Recorder Hurt's court. Black's attorney contended that the state local option law prevented the city ordinance being effective.

Attorney E. E. Kelly of Medford started habeas corpus proceedings before Circuit Judge Calkins in an effort to have his client released from custody. H. V. Richardson appeared for Ashland and both attorneys submitted briefs on the matter. The judge rendered his decision as follows:

"In 1905, subsequent to the passage of the local option law, the legislative assembly passed a special act requiring the question of licensing the sale of intoxicating liquor to be submitted to a vote of the people in the city of Ashland. This act of 1905 repeals 'all acts or parts of acts, either general or special, insofar as the same conflict with the provisions of this act.'

"This in effect repeals the local option law so far as it applies to the city of Ashland and the election of 1908 was just as valid as it applies to Ashland as it was in its application to Medford, as decided in the case of Hall vs. Dunn, 52 Ore. 475.

"The repealing clause in this act is even stronger than the repealing clause in the act amending the Medford charter, involved in that case."
