

M'NAMARAS GET BRIEF RESPITE

Trial Postponed From June 1 to July 5—Judge Says There Must Not be Any Further Procrastination in the Case.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 27.—Judge Walter Bordwell today extended the time set for the pleading of John J. and James B. McNamara, charged with complicity in the Times dynamiting from June 1 to July 5.

The extension only after much bickering was granted on the part of District Attorney Fredericks and counsel for the defense. Fredericks declared that in his opinion ten days would be a sufficient delay. The motion for the continuance was made by Leconte Davis, who asked for the extension on the ground that Clarence Darrow had not had time to familiarize himself with the California code. Upon Fredericks' objection, Darrow addressed the court. He stated that in fairness to himself and his clients he believed that he should be given at least a month to familiarize himself with the transcript of the testimony, so that he might more intelligently be able to file a demurrer and motion to set aside the indictment, which he intimated would be done at the time of pleading.

No Further Delay. When Judge Bordwell granted the continuance he expressly stated that there must be no more procrastination in the preliminary in the procedure. Darrow replied that as far as the defense was concerned there would not be.

The hearing was scheduled for 9 o'clock, but Darrow was delayed 45 minutes in reaching the court because he had been misdirected and had gone to the courthouse.

FOREST FIRE BUG GUILTY

Frank Kirri Convicted of Setting Fire in Crater National Forest and is Sentenced to Two Months in Federal Penitentiary.

Frank Kirri was convicted in the federal court at Portland last week for incendiarism on the Crater national forest and sentenced to two months' imprisonment. Kirri set a fire along the trail leading from Huckleberry mountain and, while the fire was discovered and extinguished before it did any material damage, he had violated a federal statute and now has an opportunity to repent his act while doing duty in the federal penitentiary. Mr. Kirri was a resident of California.

This is one of the three fire cases sent up before the federal courts. Convictions in each instance were made, but the sentence imposed by Judge Wolverton has not yet been given out. One of these cases involves the big fire last summer on Elk creek. In other districts throughout Oregon and Washington several indictments have been returned by the federal grand jury and some penitentiary sentences are expected.

THOMAS F. RYAN SERIOUSLY ILL

Family Simply States That He is "Doing Nicely"—Financiers Generally Fear That His Condition is Dangerous.

NEW YORK, May 27.—The family of Thomas F. Ryan, who yesterday submitted to a serious operation, refuse to divulge his condition further than to say "he is doing nicely." Financiers generally fear that his condition is serious. Not even the nature of Ryan's operation has yet been disclosed. As soon as possible, in case he recovers, Ryan will go abroad to escape the city's heat.

WHEELING, W. Va., May 27.—It is reported here today that Mrs. Laura Farnsworth Schenck who was recently tried on a charge of trying to poison her husband John O. Schenck is dying of a broken heart because she is not permitted to see her two children. On Monday her attorneys will try to get permission from the court to permit her to do so.

Is the Deliverer of China



HIS EXCELLENCY SHENG-SUAN-HUAI

PEKIN, May 27.—"When things look darkest, the man appears." So runs the Chinese proverb. For two years and more China has been in a condition of drift. Ever since death tore the reins of government from the firm grasp of the old empress dowager the end and aim of Chinese officialdom has been to avoid assuming responsibility. If the result has not been chance, it has been a condition almost as dangerous and quite as unsatisfactory. The ship of state has been drifting about rudderless, at times perilously close to the rocks. In the opinion of many Chinese, a crisis is near at hand.

Sheng-Suan-Huai the man fore-ordained to play the role of deliverer. It begins to look so, for Sheng is certainly the man of the hour in Peking.

While the currency reform and industrial development loan agreement, in the negotiation of which American financiers and, incidentally, the American government, played the foremost parts, was signed by Duke Tsai-Tse as president of the board of finance, Sheng was throughout the chief negotiator for the Chinese government. The whole thing was, in fact, in his hands.

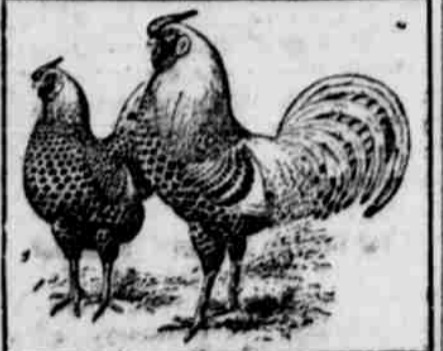
The temperature yesterday touched 95 and today is again rising rapidly. The humidity is most oppressive. It is reported that the infant mortality is the highest in the city's history.

FIFTY PERISH IN SHIP WRECK

Steamer Taboga Lost—Running at Full Speed She Strikes Reef off Guantanamo Point—Gunboat to Rescue.

PANAMA, May 27.—Wireless reports from the United States Gunboat Yorktown received here today say that more than fifty persons perished when the Steamer Taboga sank Tuesday night off Guantanamo Point.

The Yorktown has most of the survivors on board. The wireless said that the Taboga was running at full speed when she struck. She filled and sank in ten minutes, so rapidly that it was impossible for all her passengers to reach the boats, and many of them were drawn down and drowned in the vessel's suction when she sank.
