

SULTAN NAMED MORAL PERVERT

Frenchmen Are Sore Because Their Army Has Been Sent to Assistance of Degenerate Ruler of Morocco in His Troubles.

PARIS, May 27.—That France should lend its aid toward keeping on his throne one of the most filthy, lewd and lawless monarchs in the world—Sultan Mulai Hafid, of Morocco—is a thorn in the flesh of many Frenchmen.

"It is simply a case of a savage tyrant and a pollitown soldiery face to face with a cluster of gallant tribesmen who have been goaded to revolt by cruelty and extortion." A French newspaper correspondent who had been there told me, in describing the conditions at Fez, the Sultan's capital. "And it is to maintain this tyrant on the throne that brave French officers are risking their lives, and because of whom the lives of Europeans in Morocco are in constant peril, that a large force has been dispatched to Fez. It is perfectly clear that there can never be any real peace there until Sultan Mulai Hafid is removed from power. The best thing for all concerned would be the return of Abdul Aziz. A talk with any tribesmen would prove this."

Mulai Hafid long ago proved himself a moral pervert of the worst sort and, seriously speaking, a dangerous fanatic. In the midst of the siege of Fez he took it into his head, late one night, that he would marry his cousin, the daughter of his uncle Mulu Omar, who died a few months ago. All the native dancers were awakened in the dead of night and forced to hasten to the Magzen where a great fete was in progress. The feast was a revel of the deepest purple. At its height, two wounded soldiers, who had assisted in holding off the Sultan's enemies, were lying moaning at the city's gate, begging to be taken in. One of them died before morning.

WICKERSHAM'S ACCOUNTS ARE TO BE INVESTIGATED

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Attorney General Wickersham will appear before the committee of expenditures in the department of justice to testify regarding his accounts. Charges that agents of the government along Mexican borders have been overfriendly to Diaz forces will be probed. It is alleged that the secret service opened private mail sent copies of the letters to the department and generally maintained a system of "vicious espionage."

The Philippine friar lands incident also will be investigated.

HUSBAND'S CONVALESCENCE CHANGES BESSIE'S MIND

NEW YORK, May 27.—Urged by a cable report from her mother that her husband was at the point of death, Bessie V. Clayton, a dancer the wife of Julian Mitchell, is heretoday from London. When she learned that Julian was convalescing Bessie said she would not see him and become reconciled, but would return to London. She sought a divorce a year ago but when she learned of Mitchell's illness she cancelled all theatrical engagements and rushed to America. And then she changed her mind.

FREIGHT TRAINS TO BURN COAL INSTEAD OF OIL

PORTLAND, Ore., May 27.—Practically every freight on the O. R. W. & N. railroad and Southern Pacific in the northwest will burn coal instead of oil in the future, according to Harriman officials here today. Oil which is now used will be confined to passenger trains. The decision to burn coal resulted from a conference between J. P. O'Brien and D. O. Clark, vice president of the Union Pacific Coal company.

TIA JUANA INSURRECTOS WILL RESIST MADERO

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 26.—General Pryce who captured Tia Juana, has taken steps to repel any possible attack by Madero's forces. Pryce has recruited 800 men, the majority Americans. These men are well disciplined. During Pryce's absence, their behavior has been excellent. Pryce has maintained an elaborate patrol system in Tia Juana since he has been in control there.

DARROW NAMES TWO ASSOCIATE ATTORNEYS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 27.—Clarence Darrow announced this afternoon that his attorneys Lecomte Davis and Joseph Scott, both of Los Angeles, would be associated with him in the defense of the McNamara brothers, charged with complicity in the wrecking of the Times building.

Fifteen-Year-Old Girl Disappears

BOSTON, Mass., May 27.—That 15-year-old Gertrude Quimby, who disappeared from her home in the Back Bay district on Monday, is in New York is the belief of the Boston police. A. H. Werner, a wealthy automobile manufacturer, is going to New York to search for her. The only clue in the possession of the father is the note left by Miss Quimby in her pocketbook.

In the description furnished the police was the statement that the girl has light complexion and hair, "blue eyes and a baby face." When she disappeared Miss Quimby wore a black tailored suit. There was a wide white collar about her neck and she wore a sailor hat with a black band. She carried a buff colored leather suit case. The police records show that on April 29 the girl was reported to the police as missing. They began an investigation and that evening they were informed that Miss Quimby had returned to her home.

VANCOUVER MAY GET BIG STRIKE

Unionism in British Columbia Metropolitan Throws Down Gauntlet to Federated Employer Association of the Pacific Coast.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 27.—Vancover unionism has thrown down the gauntlet to the Federated Employers' association of the Pacific Coast. The struggle is to be fought to a finish.

A general strike affecting practically every union in the city with the exception of the Allied Printing Trades will be called on June 5. This was decided upon at a meeting of representatives of labor held under the auspices of the trades and labor council last night when a vote of 40 to 5 was recorded in favor of a cessation of work. The strike will be preceded by a monster labor parade next Saturday.

WASHINGTON DEFEATS CALIFORNIA AT ROWING

SEATTLE, Wash., May 26.—By defeating the University of California crew over a three mile course in the local coast record time of 15 minutes and 22 seconds, the University of Washington crew team today claims the right to the coast championship for rowing. The race was on Lake Washington in smooth water. The Washington worked machine-like from the first and soon had a lead of one length, finishing seven lengths ahead. California freshmen dropped out of the junior race at the end of the first mile when an oarshell broke.

M'CARTHY SAID TO BE GRAFTER

Now Charged With Conniving With Police Commissioners to Remove Chief of Police Seymour, Who Has Put End to Wide Open Town.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 27.—Despite persistent rumors that at the meeting of the San Francisco board of police commissioners next Wednesday Chief of Police John Seymour will be dismissed for incompetence, there today is not the slightest evidence among the tenderloin resorts here of resuming business, as it is rumored Mayor McCarthy wishes to permit them to do. Only at the beach resorts is the early-closing law being ignored, and Chief Seymour today declared he would move against those resort owners at once.

"I am still chief of police of San Francisco," said Seymour today. "The lid is on in the tenderloin and it will stay on. I have been advised by the grand jurors that they are with me in this fight. The deadfalls and dens of vice which flourished when I became chief will never be allowed to resume while I hold down the job. I am here to stay the full length of my term—four years—and cannot be broken on any trumped up charge." Seymour's attorney, Peter F. Dunne, is said to be preparing charges against the board of police commissioners for conspiracy with Mayor McCarthy to dismiss Seymour.

MARKET TAKES BRACE STOCKS ARE ADVANCED

NEW YORK, May 27.—The stock market at the opening today showed a relaxation of yesterday's pressure against United States Steel. The market took on a brace and prices were advanced moderately. General Electric rose 1, Canadian Pacific 1, Atchafon and Westinghouse Electric 3-4, Reading 5-8, Union Pacific and Amalgamated Copper 1. The resignation of President Diaz caused an advance in Mexican securities, National Railways of Mexico second preferred rising 3-4. The market closed strong. Bonds were firm.

ROBBERS ARE FREED AND VICTIM CONVICTED

SEATTLE, Wash., May 27.—After being convicted and facing a penitentiary term for an assault, Biagio Falina has been found the innocent victim of highway robbers. He was convicted on the testimony of a saloon keeper, bar tender and porter, but Judge Ronald got suspicious and started an investigation which showed that Falina, instead of being an aggressor, was robbed of \$200. He was freed.

HEAVY TAXES HURT ENGLAND

Middle Class is Being Gradually Taxed Out of Existence—Due to Its Rule by an Oligarchy—Rich Men Victimized.

LONDON, May 27.—England is gradually taxing its middle class out of existence. It is true that there are more heavily taxed countries in Europe but there is not one where the man of what ought to be just a comfortable income is so frightfully burdened as in Great Britain. Germany's exactions, for instance, are enormous but the government sees to it that the rich pay in proportion to their means. Spain raises its revenues by grinding the faces of the poor. In England the rich and poor alike get off lightly and middle class settles for them both.

The trouble is that England is ruled by an oligarchy. Russia and Austria and Germany are practically under the thumbs of three different individuals. To these individuals a rich man's money is if anything a greater temptation than a poor one's—because there is more of it. Of course, each one has a circle about him to which he gives exceptional privileges but these circles are small. England's privileged group is a pretty large one. And the governmental power, instead of being vested in one man, is vested, jointly, in all the members of the group.

In Russia and Austria and Germany, rich and poor alike contribute to the support of their respective rulers. In England the middle classes contribute to the further enrichment of the already rich—the oligarchy. It is considerably more expensive to support an oligarchy of some thousands than to support a single despot. England is supposed to be a cheap country to live in. So it is for two classes—rich and poor. It would also be cheap for the middle classes if it were not for the fact that everything they can save is taken away from them in taxes.

PREACHER FOUND GUILTY OF HERESY

Dr. Grant Bows to the Decision Saying He is Suffering as Few Have Suffered for the Church Will Submit to Decision.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 27.—The judicial committee of the Presbyterian General Assembly rendered a verdict today finding Dr. William Grant guilty of heresy, but recommending leniency. The assembly affirmed the verdict and ruled that the clergyman be suspended from the right to preach until he shall renounce his utterances.

After the verdict had been rendered Dr. Grant said to the United Press: "I reverently and lovingly bow to the decision. The awful truth of the verdict has hardly reached my realization. I am suffering as few have suffered for the church. Humiliation seems to stop my heart beats. The blow is crushing. "Through it all I still remain unshaken in my faith to our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, in his deity, his virgin birth and resurrection and his mediatorial office as set forth in the scriptures, the Old and New Testament."

"This is verdict terribly trying. In my own heart I am positive I have never knowingly preached, uttered or written contrary to the things of which I have just spoken. I profess my innocence and declare my unshakable belief in the word of God."
