Request That She Establish Her University in Rogue River Valley Assumes Great Proportions—Organizations Telegraph.

Telegrams are going forward today to Mrs. E. H. Harriman asking that she choose the Rogue River Valley as a site for her new university signed by Mayor Canon, President Colvig of the Commercial Club, the officials of the university club and several other local organizations.

The entire city and valley is rallying to the movement and it is believed that the request to Mrs. Harriman will soon assume such proportions that she will at least consider Medford.

JUDGE TO HOLD COURT IN THE PRIMEVAL FOREST

SEATTLE, Wash., May 30.—To settle condemnation proceedings Judge R. B. Albertson and a complete jury, attended by bailiffs and clerks, will enter the wilds of the Cedar river watershed next Monday and hold court in the forests.

The city of Seattle is seeking, through condemnation, to acquire three-fourths of the watershed not now in possession of the city, extending from Seattle to the Stampede tunnel in the Cascade mountains, with a width of 12 miles north and south. In order to better judge the value of the lands, the court and jury will cover it.

MILWAUKEE STARTS TRAINS TO CHICAGO

TACOMA, Wash., May 30.—Transcontinental passenger service on the Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound Railroad between Tacoma and Chicago was inaugurated when the "Olympian Limited" pulled out for the east amid the cheers of hundreds of persons who had congregated at the station.

Although local service has been maintained by the Milwaukee line for nearly two years, today marks the beginning of through passenger service in a fast schedule. The roadbed has been pounded into perfect condition by the heavy freight traffic and officials of the company say there will be no difficulty in maintaining the 72 hour service on which the two all-steel trains will travel daily in each direction.

EL PASO, Texas, May 30.—The legislature of the state of Sonora refuses to install Madero's selection for governor. Madero at once ordered his troops to surround Hermosilla and threaten the legislature into action.

W. COOPER MORRIS IS CLAD IN CONVICT GARB

SALEM, Or., May 30.—Being permanently dressed in the regulation prison uniform, W. Cooper Morris now accepts his lot in a matter-of-fact way. He is of good disposition today and ate a hearty breakfast alongside his fellow prisoners in the community dining-room. There are 70 idle prisoners ahead of Morris, and until they have all been placed at work, Morris' only duties will be to eat, sleep and take exercise in the "bull ring."

MAYOR REFUSES TO RESIGN HIS POSITION

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., May 30.—Citizens of Oklahoma City today sent a committee to "reason with" Mayor Van Lackey, who has refused to relinquish his office since the election of a new mayor and commissioners. Lackey was elected mayor under the councilmanic form of government and says he will not resign until ordered to do so by the court. When Lackey attempted to justify his position before 5000 citizens he was hooted and jeered.

CARUSO SUED BY SHOP GIRL OF MILAN

LONDON, May 30.—It required some of the highest, shrewdest notes that Enrico Caruso could command today to express his indignation at being sued for breach of promise by a "shop girl" of Milan. The tenor was very angry and explained with much vehemence that the case, in which she asks \$50,000 for breach of promise, was based on letters written when he endeavored to engage her as a housekeeper. Caruso said the letters were somewhat intimate, but that they contained no promise of marriage, and after he had met the girl with some family, he decided she was "low and common" and he could not engage her. He said he had asked for his letters but had not received them.

RAILROADS OF COUNTRY DECLINE IN EARNINGS

CHICAGO, Ill., May 30.—Returns for March from all the railroads in the United States show a decrease of \$43 per mile in revenue as compared with the corresponding month last year. Operating expenses also decreased as compared with a year ago, the decline amounting to 13.8 per cent in maintenance of way and 4.7 per cent in maintenance of equipment. The net decrease was due to the large decrease in gross with out a corresponding decline in expenses.
