

MANY ATTEND LABOR MEETING

Nearly 500 Persons Present at Open Session of Labor Council—Organizer Young Delivers Address With Telling Effect.

The labor situation in Medford and the Rogue River Valley was thoroughly thrashed out at a meeting held last evening at the Natatorium when the Central Labor Council of this city held an open session for the purpose of explaining more fully to the business men and employers of this city the aims of organized labor.

A number of other speakers addressed the meeting including H. C. son, George H. Millar, and F. W. Cotterill. George B. Hughes, president of the carpenters' union presided and introduced the various speakers.

CORONER'S JURY JOLTS ELECTRIC LIGHT COMPANY

The coroners jury which probed the death of James McLaugherty, who was electrocuted Saturday while at work connecting a motor at the Opp mine returned a verdict Monday afternoon substantially as follows:

James McLaugherty was about 21 years of age and came to his death about one mile west of Jacksonville, by being electrocuted. The same was an accident; the deceased was less than 21 years of age; but we find that the deceased was working without skilled assistance and proper support; that there was no one at hand to administer the proper and usual means of resuscitation, which might have saved his life.

POWER COMPANY FILES DEMURRER, ASHLAND CASE

The city of Ashland received a jolt Saturday, when the Rogue River Electric Light & Power company filed suit to compel that company to furnish power to supplement the municipal electric light and power system soon to be put into operation.

McLALLEN ACQUITTED OF MURDER CHARGE

ROSEBURG, Or., May 30.—After a trial lasting nearly four days, Roy McLallen, who shot and killed Ben A. Mahan, in this city the night of March 13, was acquitted by a jury in the state circuit court here of the charge of murder in the second degree.

SEATTLE FISHING BOAT CONFISCATED FOR KING

VICTORIA, B. C., May 30.—The gasoline fishing schooner Edrie of Seattle, was condemned and confiscated to his majesty the king as a prize by Chief Justice Hunter today for fishing within the three mile limit off Lanz Island, at the northwest end of Vancouver island, where she was seized in February by the Canadian cruiser Rainbow, which fired a blank shot, causing the Edrie to heave to and sent an armed party on board who took the vessel in tow to Vancouver.

WEST APPOINTS MRS. OSBORNE

Medford Nurse Made Member of State Board of Nurses by Governor—Will examine and Register Applicants for Nurse Certificates.

Mrs. Olivia Osborne, who conducts the Southern Oregon hospital in this city, has been appointed to the state board of nurses by governor West.

Under a law passed by the recent legislature, a state board of examination and registration of graduate nurses, composed of three nurses, is provided whose duty it shall be to enforce the provisions of the act. The members were selected from a list of five names suggested by the state association of graduate nurses.

The members of the board receive a salary of \$4.00 per day and expenses while engaged in attendance upon the board.

CODLING MOTHS INJURE WALLA WALLA FRUIT

WALLA WALLA, Wash., May 30.—Codling moth are beginning to hatch and District Fruit Inspector C. L. Whitney has issued notice that the second spraying for this pest should be done in this vicinity between June 1 and June 10. The codling moth eggs, in which the broods are being watched this year, show that the hatch is just ready and the spraying must be begun this week.

According to Mr. Whitney, who recently returned from Dayton and other Touchet valley points, the fruit crop of that section will be from 50 to 60 per cent of last year's crop. This condition, he said, is not due to frosts, but to the fact that the trees overbore last year. Mr. Whitney explained that in some sections of the valley where the crop was not so heavy last year that the trees are loaded and the fruit will require a great deal of thinning. It is reported that Pomona orchard will have only 50 per cent of last year's crop this season.
